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

#### Dear Friends

In 2016 a new phenomenon arrived in our world going by the name of 'fake news'. Until this year I can't ever recall hearing this phrase but now it's impossible to escape!

Wikipedia informs us that, 'fake news' is a type of hoax or deliberate spread of misinformation with the intent to mislead in order to gain financially or politically, increase readership, promote online sharing and sometimes just to cause a little bit of mayhem. The deliberate making up of news stories to fool or entertain is nothing new. The arrival of Social Media, however, has meant real and fictional stories are now presented in such a similar way that it can sometimes be difficult to tell the two apart. Winston Churchill is attributed as saying, 'A lie gets halfway around the world before the truth has a chance to get its pants on'. Interestingly of course this statement was made long before the world could appreciate how quickly stories can be shared with a click of a button, an 'upload' or 'share'.

Long before Social Media (and the invention of the printing press) the world had the spoken word, the art of storytelling and the ability to converse and share. It is by this medium of conversation that the stories at the heart of the Christian Faith became established and were shared.

In the aftermath of Jesus' life on earth (which we know from sources outwith the Bible is a fact), the biographical account of Jesus' life, His words, works and encounters were established through the stories told by ordinary people. They were the witnesses to the momentous, magnificent, poignant and sometimes strange goings-on. Out of these accounts was born four Gospels and the writings of the early Church which form the New Testament that is so important to the followers of Jesus both then and now. Today Christians span the globe.

As we celebrate Easter within our Christian Calendar, the events surrounding the Cross, Death and Resurrection of Jesus remain a mystery. Despite these 'other-worldly' accounts, billions of people around our world are able to point to the Gospel as a source of Truth that provides foundation and encouragement for the whole of life and influences our day-to-day existence as Christians.

Yet for many others the accounts available and (in their minds) the lack of spiritual evidence apparent in their lives, are not enough to convince them that the story of Christianity is anything other than 'fake news'.

At Mannofield Church, we are delighted with our fantastic newly refurbished building and want to share it with as many people in our local community and beyond as possible. As part of our outreach programme, all of the different as

Food poverty is a national concern and it is increasing alarmingly. Foodbanks are even needed in "wealthy" Aberdeen.



### Medicine Sick Day Rules

When you are unwell with any of the following:

Vomiting or diarrhoea (unless only minor)

Fevers, sweats and shaking

Then STOP taking the medicines listed below – restart when you are well (after 24-48 hours of eating and drinking normally).

If you are in any doubt, contact your pharmacist, GP or nurse.

ACE inhibitors: medicine names ending in "pril" e.g. lisinopril, perindopril, Ramipril

ARBs: medicine names ending in "sartan" e.g. losartan, candesartan, valsartan

NSAIDs: anti-inflammatory pain killers e.g. ibuprofen, diclofenac, naproxen Diuretics: sometimes called "water pills" e.g. furosemide, spironolactone, indapamide, bendroflumethiazide

Metformin: a medicine for diabetes

### **Embroidered Panel 2016**

To commemorate the completion of the refurbished church the panel was lovingly stitched by ladies of the congregation from Fraser Beaton's design. Fraser is a former Elder of the church who has now retired to the Borders. He also designed the glass panels in the doors leading from the vestibule to the Sanctuary. As such



the design complements both these and the existing stained glass windows in the Chancel.

It is a celebration of various aspects of our Christian faith with reference to periods in the church calendar: the birth, life, death and resurrection of Our Lord, set in juxtaposition with our church life at Mannofield today.

Central to the design is the cross, a reminder of the sacrifice that Jesus made for us, that in his Crucifixion He died, but rose again that we might live and have eternal life.

## **CAFE CONNECT** — Opening Soon

On 31 January the Church's Kirk Session approved proposals to convert the Centenary Hall to a Community Cafe.

With funding from the Barrack Trust and the Aviva Community Fund to meet the start up costs plus an extremely generous gift from an anonymous donor to underwrite the immediate operational costs, a company limited by guarantee was incorporated on 22 February.

Cafe Connect (Mannofield) Ltd, trading as Cafe Connect, is aiming to open its doors for business in April. The Company has 6 Directors - Keith Blackwood, Louise Barrack, Iain Hunter, Ann Kindness, Doug Marnoch and Roddy McColl who is also Company Secretary.

The Board is delighted to have secured the services of Kirsty Macrae formerly of Circles @ Mannofield. Kirsty and her well known team will bring a wealth of experience to this exciting venture.

In our successful Application to the Aviva Community Fund which resulted in us being awarded £5,000 we highlighted that the creation of this cafe would enable us to develop and engender community engagement, targetting loneliness and isolation. It will benefit the whole community including:

- 1. The Elderly
- 2. People with dementia and their carers
- 3. Young parents and their children

It is our intention that the community will have an easily accessible, local and inclusive venue to meet and experience a welcoming, friendly environment providing affordable, nourishing food.

Many within the community will have the opportunity to volunteer and feel useful in a very practical, enjoyable and rewarding way.

## Q. If you could change something about yourself, what would it be?


A. To be more positive about public speaking.

The Scottish Ambulance service has been working with the British Heart Foundation to find locations where these devices will come in useful and have even been providing community training for them.

However recently a new challenge has presented itself and that is that many independently bought community defibrillators are not registered with the ambulance service. So we must all ensure groups who purchase this lifesaving equipment register it with emergency services.

Easter falls at a time when some of us may be getting a bit more health and fitness conscious as we look forward to summer holidays and perhaps want to feel that bit slimmer and healthier in the sunshine.

A lot of attention is rightly given to healthy eating and being active and I am delighted to see Mannofield church is setting up its own jogging and running club (see the Church's Facebook page for information) and is encouraging the congregation to come together to support each other's fitness efforts. We all benefit when we look after our heart health and whilst fitness is something we have to take responsibility for ourselves, I have been working to ensure our local services are improving in other ways to assist that.

## "Make it happen"

Since 2012 our local play parks have benefitted from £210,000 of investment and our local Library at Airyhall has had a £250,000 refurbishment.

I am also very proud of the achievements of the Council with five years of balanced budgets with no cuts to front line services. Indeed, as I have reported before we have a capital spend of £145millon on Education with new schools being built throughout the city. I was also thrilled to have recently announced the name of our new Centre of Excellence, for children with the most severe and complex needs, and those children and young people with additional support needs. "Orchard Brae" will open in August and it will be the first facility of its kind in Scotland.


We can also look forward to the re-opening of Aberdeen Art Gallery, the Music Hall, Provost Skene's House and the new £330m Aberdeen Exhibition and Conference Centre. Work is also commencing on enhancing our much loved Union Terrace Gardens – an investment of £20million which will see improved access and activity whilst conserving its rich heritage.

Now in its fourth year, SPECTRA, the award-winning festival of light proved to be a fantastic success with visitor figures doubling this year -63,000 people attended the four-day programme. As well as the obvious cultural and social value that events of this scale bring, we cannot overlook the significant economic benefits.


Our city has a lot to be rightly proud of, despite the current challenges we face with the economic downturn, which has had a huge impact on the city and our families and friends.



#### North East Scotland's Wildlife

An important meeting will take place in Mannofield Church on the evening of Tuesday 18 April. Hosted by the Aberdeen and Aberdeenshire Network of Eco Congregation Scotland, the focus will be on wildlife recording.



Tea, coffee and biscuits will be served from 7pm, before the meeting proper starts at 7:30pm. The main speaker is Glenn Roberts of North East Scotland Biological Records Centre, who is talking about "Recording Local Wildlife and the Mammal Atlas of North-East Scotland".

Food and shelter are the vital attractions for wildlife. In addition to our gardens, there are great living quarters along the former Deeside railway line and in a few other odd corners. But most of our wildlife tries its best to stay well hidden. We only see the tip of a very large iceberg. In fact, there's probably more wildlife in Mannofield than on the average farm.

We are all quite used to common garden birds like the blackbird, robin or sparrow flitting about. Gardeners will be all too aware of the slugs, snails and creepy-crawlies that live off anything that grows. Foxes are not unusual in my garden, and one even seems to have palled up with a neighbour's cat! A roe deer has helped herself to my purple sprouting broccoli, contentedly chewing cud for about twenty minutes afterwards. One pest that is less common nowadays is the herring gull, thanks largely to the introduction of wheelie bins

## The Guild Cross of Stones

Each year the Guild nationally chooses and works on a theme. In 1997 (the 90th Anniversary of Mannofield Church's



Guild) this was "Together for God".

One of the suggestions from the central Guild office in Edinburgh was that each lady (only ladies were Guild members in 1997) should take to a meeting a stone or pebble which in some way represented her.

Perhaps this stone came from her garden, from a favourite holiday destination, a picnic spot or a place with memories. Whatever its origins, it would have its own significance to the giver.

The idea was to set out night lights in the form of a cross and that in turn each lady placed her stone between the candles. She could then share the story behind the stone or simply put it down. 

## Joseph Knight by James Robertson

Exiled to Jamaica after the horrors of the Battle of Culloden, the young Sir John Wedderburn quickly made a fortune, alongside his three brothers, as a sugar planter. When he returned to Scotland to marry and re-establish the family name, he brought with him Joseph Knight, a black slave, one of the first in Scotland, a token of his years in the Caribbean. At the end of his life, long after the Edinburgh court case which went to the heart of Scottish society, pitting master against slave, property against freedom, Wedderburn tries to track down



Joseph Knight who has been missing for twenty-four years and whom he has never forgotten.

From the Highland battlefields to the Caribbean, from Enlightenment Edinburgh to the back streets of Dundee, James Robertson's novel is a tour de force that dramatically retells a fascinating but forgotten episode in Scottish history.

Hello, I'm David Cowie and I have just started as one of the Sergeants POLICE here at the West End and Hazlehead Community Policing Team. I am a proud father of two boys aged 9 and 7. They are extremely active and SCOTLAND my role has already changed from father to taxi driver! I coach my eldest son's football team and take great satisfaction from seeing these boys developing into a strong group of friends who also work well as a team.

I have been in the Police for just over 12 years and previously worked in the area. It's good to be back to see what has changed. The first thing I notice is I'm a bit older and the staff look a bit younger!

I have worked in a variety of roles in my 12 years' service including neighbourhood, response and CID roles but I can genuinely say the role I enjoy the most is being involved with Community Policing.

My current role involves assisting the Inspector in any way I can to ensure the other Sergeants and Officers can spend the maximum time dealing with and helping members of the public.

In the short time I have been here I have been very impressed with the attitude of the Officers who are motivated to go out and do their job. I have been equally pleased with the willingness the public have shown to pick up the telephone and report on going or suspicious incidents.

Please continue to call the Police if something doesn't look right as there is no better feeling as a Police officer than dealing efficiently with an incident and helping the public.

Two issues which have regularly reared their heads in the area are acquisitive crime and road traffic incidents.

The West End and Hazlehead Community Policing Team is constantly reaffirming the message that if properties and vehicles are secured it is very difficult for thieves to gain entry. These simple steps greatly reduce the likelihood of being a victim of a crime. I would encourage everyone to make it as difficult as possible for thieves to succeed.

In relation to road traffic incidents and safety. The West End and Hazlehead Community Policing Team is working hard to ensure that both pedestrians and vehicle drivers are safe and enjoy the roads. We have been working closely with schools in the area and are out with the Muniquip gun in areas where the public are directing us to target. This is having a positive effect in the area but I would urge everyone again to ensure they are aware of speed limits and ensure vehicles are road worthy.

I look forward to meeting and speaking to as many people in the area as possible.

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## Business Rates and Council Tax

My inbox has been filled by local businesses who face enormous increases in their business rates. I have been active in supporting employers that were crying out for help.

Many businesses are not going to benefit from the measures announced. While the action from the Finance Secretary was very welcome, it does not go far enough and only provides relief for one year. We do not want all our businesses to be back in the same position again next year.

Also dominating my inbox are messages from constituents about to be hit by a Council Tax hike.

Households across Aberdeen City are facing hefty Council Tax increases due to a decision by the Scottish Government.

These Council Tax increases leave thousands of local people in Aberdeen facing increases in their bills of anywhere between £113 in Band E and £600 in Band H.

Across the city, 30,016 properties will be affected by the Scottish Government's Council Tax, disproportionally hitting this area.

The bill in my ward of Hazlehead, Ashley and Queen's Cross will account for about £1.6million. while the Lower Deeside ward will contribute more than £1.2million.

I know many residents who have owned their home for over 30 years and as much as they live in a band H property they simply do not have the income to pay. They are therefore asset rich but income poor. Given the downturn in oil and gas with the numbers of people who have been made redundant this is even more common.

After a nine-year Council Tax freeze, people will not object to paying a little bit more, provided they see improvement in local services. However, this comes while the Scottish government is cutting funding for Aberdeen in real terms by nearly £15million, making it increasingly difficult to maintain frontline services.

I would like to take this opportunity to wish all of my constituents a very happy and peaceful Easter.


