

#### Dear Friends

Taking a coffee break and flicking through the 'Press and Journal' I came across the double page spread detailing the background to the McCartneys' divorce case. The legal drama that has unfolded over recent months has received constant media attention and now of course the precise detail of the settlement has been made available to everyone in all sorts of ways. It makes for sorry reading. As with any such situation like this, the individual parties put forward their own arguments as to what in their mind they are entitled to receive.

In this case it was left to a judge to decide and in doing so Mr Justice Bennett was hugely critical of the way in which 'greed' seemed to influence the whole sorry business with one party in particular putting forward ridiculous claims on required living expenses that were tinged with creative selfishness at best, and full of untruths at worst.

Legal wrangling in situations of marriage breakdown is in many situations unavoidable. We often hear people quite rightly referring to the danger of acrimony affecting the children of couples in such a position. Encouragement is given to individuals to remember the children and for their sake seek amicable relations throughout the settlement procedure and beyond.

In the McCartneys' case there is a child and I am sure the majority of people are hoping and praying that she will be protected from the sleaze and the prying eyes of the media in the hope that she can be supported by both parents in establishing a solid, emotional and loving foundation for her life. This would be our prayer for all children caught up in such a situation.

But would we not also pray that the McCartneys themselves might move on from this twisted debacle and go on to achieve something positive and meaningful with their lives? Would we not pray that they find a way to leave the unhappiness behind and rediscover happiness and joy in their lives? I think we can pray for that for them - even if some of the legal acrimony and conduct has left us shaking our heads!

'New Starts' are often talked about and why shouldn't they be?

In life so many things go wrong for us - sometimes through our own lack of foresight and planning, sometimes through misconduct, sometimes through circumstances completely out of our control. Once the dust has settled what hopefulness there is in the opportunity for 'new starts.'

This opportunity the Bible and Christian Faith would tell us is God's way of saying to us – 'my love is so strong for you, that no matter what you do, my love will provide you with an opportunity for a 'new start' and the chance to live in a new life that brings with it potential for Love, Hope and Faith'.

Easter is the constant reminder of the Love of God and of His promise for 'New Starts'. The Cross reminds us of the tragedy of making the wrong choices in life; the empty tomb reminds us of the clean slate and fresh opportunity for living life by the example of Jesus Christ and in the pursuit of those things and behaviour deemed acceptable to God.

As we move on from Easter may we take heart in the message it brings us and may we be ready take up the opportunity for 'new starts' when we are required to do so.

Let us pray for all those for whom life has been fraught with tension, bitterness, spite and selfishness. Let us hope that people are able to capture something of the spirit of Easter and celebrate the fact that no matter what trouble encapsulates their past God's love provides them with the chance for a 'New Start!'

### APPOINTMENT OF ASSISTANT MINISTER

In 2006 Aberdeen Presbytery agreed that Mannofield, on account of its size and workload expected of its Minister, should be given the right to a full-time Assistant Minister paid for from the central funds of the Church of Scotland in Edinburgh. Over the last 6 months the search has been on for a person to fill this vacancy and a thorough process of advertising the vacancy and then interviewing candidates has taken place.



With great delight I am able to tell the congregation that this process has concluded with the recommendation that **Alisa Ferlicca** be appointed as Assistant Minister of Mannofield Parish Church.

Alisa is shortly to complete her training at Princeton Seminary in the USA and will be ordained as a minister of the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America in the early summer before taking up her appointment with us in August. Alisa has undertaken an extensive process of training for the Ministry and has particular experience in Children's Ministry and in working with families with Young Church. She has undertaken a placement as a Hospital Chaplain and is experienced at working as part of a Team Ministry.

Those of us who have interviewed Alisa and met her on her trip to Aberdeen a few weeks ago are suitably impressed with her enthusiasm and energy. She will bring with her an experience of church outside Scotland and plenty of freshness that will compliment what we have already in place.

Alisa's responsibilities will include supporting me in the general ministry requirements of a busy church and we have and will continue to identify particular areas of work that Alisa will undertake as we seek to make Mannofield a Church that caters well for all generations, and is noted for its work in the community.

I am sure Alisa will be a great asset to the Church and know that we will welcome her in August as she starts working with us.

At the Kirk Session meeting held at the end of March, a proposal submitted by a member of Session, received the majority support of the Session membership, resulting in a decision being taken to make significant change to the diet of services offered Sunday by Sunday.

In February a training afternoon for Session and Board members provided the opportunity to review the strengths and weaknesses of congregational life in Mannofield.

One of the main outcomes was the expression of dissatisfaction in the way that within the church we lack fellowship with one another. This is always a problem for larger congregations and Mannofield Church is a perfect example of a congregation not necessarily living together as a proper 'Family of God's People.' Too many people remain strangers to each other; with the result that closeness of relationships and the sharing of fellowship with each other is not as good as it should be.

Recently in a sermon Keith highlighted the factors that entitle a group of people to call themselves a 'Church'. It is not enough merely to create a situation where people attend for one hours' worship each week and not feel the need to live in strong loving relationship with others. The early church is a perfect example of a group of believers that worked, socialised, lived and worshipped together and as a result grew in numbers. In addition this foundation of fellowship was an encouragement towards individual spiritual growth and effective outreach to others as the love of God was shared far and wide.

Those at the training afternoon agreed that fellowship, and that sense of togetherness and friendship, is something that needs to be worked on in Mannofield Church. If we don't work on this area, we risk the situation that the impression we make on those who are on the fringes of church life or who are visitors to church, will not inspire them to become more involved within our church family.

The proposal to the March meeting of Session sought to address among other things this issue of how to improve fellowship in the congregation. The outcome was that Kirk Session resolved to move to one Sunday morning service at 10am. This service will replace the two services we currently offer. This new arrangement will come into effect in the summer.



No doubt this change will be a surprise to some. Services at 9.30am and 11.00am have been the norm for Mannofield for quite some time. They were introduced at a time when two services were required to cater for the numbers attending worship on a Sunday. Without doubt the ambition still exists, and the determination is still in place, to work towards re-capturing and increasing the number of regular attendees and, when successful, this might necessitate the need for two services once again. The reality of the current situation is that the combined numbers attending on Sunday mornings can easily fit into the sanctuary for one service with ample spare room.

Retaining two services at this time is thought not to be needed and the positive advantage of us meeting together for one service of worship on a Sunday morning is hard to ignore. Two services can be quite divisive as people fall into habits of attending one or other service with the result that we have, in effect, two distinct congregations. As argued at Session, this inhibits the establishment of true fellowship within the congregation.

### TIME FOR A CHANGE continued

Since the move of 'Young Church' to 9.30am the atmosphere at this service has flourished. At the same time the 11.00 service, whilst retaining a loyal band of worshippers, has struggled to cultivate that same sense of spirit and atmosphere.

One concern that our minister has is that those occasional attendees from our congregation who come to an 11 o'clock service, or indeed visitors who happen upon our 11am service, are not necessarily seeing our congregation at its best and would be unlikely to be so touched by the spirit about the place to consider attending more frequently. It is also heartening for everyone to attend a church service where children are in attendance. Whilst it is recognised that there are those who prefer the quieter atmosphere of 11 o'clock, if we are serious about church growth (and we should be), we would do well to consider the wider ramifications of creating a well attended spirited service that captures the imagination of all.

One service on a Sunday morning will give everyone a chance to share in the joy of young people in church. It will also make possible events such as soup and sandwich lunches after the service. With any luck we might be able to re-establish choir involvement on a regular basis as extra time before the service might provide the opportunity for choir practice.


The majority of Session was of the opinion that we should be encouraged to think about the positive opportunities that one service might offer rather than this being a backward step for the congregation. Making this change also comes against the backdrop of other decisions taken that will see the addition of two new types of worship service to come into effect in the autumn. A midweek short morning service followed by cup of tea/coffee will be established on a weekly basis, and once a month it is planned that the Evening Service will take on the form of a service of praise led by a Praise Band. All these changes taken together see additional variety introduced into the timings and types of worship service we offer, rather than a reduction in the services of worship we offer in a given week.

Undoubtedly some will miss having the possibility of an 11am service and some might regret the fact that instead of 9.30am the service is at 10am. A service at 10am however in the view of the Kirk Session retains the feel of a family friendly, early Sunday morning service, but at the same time makes getting ready for church on Sundays a less chaotic exercise.

Session will review the situation on an ongoing basis but ask the congregation to support this change which is made in order to re-establish that closeness of relationship in the 'Family' we call our Church.


Details of the date when this change will come into effect and other related issues such as what happens on Communion Sundays will be published later in the Spring.







The Annual Accounts for 2007 were approved by the Trustees on 18 March. The term "Trustees" is a new one to Mannofield and has been introduced to meet the requirements of the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator. Mannofield's Trustees are the combined members of the Kirk Session and Congregational Board. It is their responsibility to oversee the financial activities of the church, to ensure that proper accounting records and policies are in place and to safeguard the assets of Mannofield Church.



In summary, 2007 was not a good year for Mannofield from a financial viewpoint. The General Fund i.e. from where regular income and expenditure takes place, again showed a deficit, almost wiping out the balance in the fund carried forward from 2006. The Kirk Session and Car Funds took the brunt of major expenditure – see below.

Overall income (£180,145) was down marginally over 2006. On the positive side, regular giving showed little change over 2006. At the same time, 'one off' donations for weddings, use of premises etc reduced compared to 2006. Against this, overall expenditure (£191,240) is also marginally down on 2006. A lot of expenditure is outwith the control of Mannofield Church but wherever possible e.g. advertising of services in local papers, savings have been made. This tight control of local expenditure has helped to contain outgoings.

The overall position on regular income and expenditure is similar to 2006 with an overall deficit of approximately £11,000. This has almost wiped out the balance of funds in the General Fund and makes it impossible to 'top up' the Fabric and Car Funds from this source.

The biggest item on the Financial Agenda in 2007 was the Manse Refurbishment. As well as taking the opportunity to make some overdue improvements, housing standards set by the Church of Scotland meant that a large investment in the Manse was necessary. Expenditure on these improvements amounted to £68,100. Donations from individuals and organisations amounted to £17,900. £10,000 was transferred from the Local Ministry Contingency Fund and the balance (£40,200) had to come out of the Kirk Session Fund. The result is that the 'unreserved' balance in the Kirk Session Fund going in to 2008 is just over £19,000.

The Fabric Fund expenditure in 2007 amounted to £5,431 and this leaves a balance of £24,594 going in to 2008.

With the arrival of Rev Keith Blackwood, Mannofield was in the happy position of being able to offer him a car to help him in his duties. Prudent financial management in previous years had built up a fund of £12,500. This fund now has a balance of less than £100 with no possibility at this time of being able to set aside funds for a future replacement.

Forecasting the future is always difficult. However, if income remains at current levels, Mannofield will be facing a deficit of more than £13,000 in the General Fund in 2008. In addition, the Fabric Convener predicts expenditure of £16,000 in 2008 thus reducing the balance in the Fabric Fund quite considerably.

### Nepal Update The Craigheads

Dear Friends.

I mentioned in our last update that I was waiting for news of a job and sadly I was not successful on this occasion. Whilst I am very disappointed, we can now get on and plan for the future.

We will leave Nepal on or around 4 June and will base ourselves in Fortrose, just to the north of Inverness where Fiona's family have lived for many years. It gives Peter and Jenny the opportunity to go to their new schools for the last 3 weeks of the term.

I returned to quite a chaotic hospital after my 3 weeks away and it has taken a couple of weeks to start to sort out the difficulties. This is also the busiest time of year when I have to compile plans and budgets for the next 18 months and it has been difficult to get this done with interruptions and with the electricity off for 8 hours each day. However, I'm getting there slowly.

As we mentioned before, election fever is gripping Nepal. In the UK, elections have a fairly predictable if dull pattern to them, but in Nepal it's all rather new and the UN team here are conducting teaching sessions all over the country explaining how democracy works, and how candidates and voters should conduct themselves. The *Kathmandu Post* recently carried an article recommending that candidates do not carry guns whilst campaigning!

### FINANCIAL REVIEW 2007 continued

The above is the reality of Mannofield's finances. At this point mention should be made of the balance sitting in the Kirk Session Fund. Mannofield has adopted a policy of 'reserving' the first £100,000 in the Kirk Session Fund to help with Youth Work. The interest from this sum is used to offset the cost of the Youth Worker. This is considered to be a reasonable and prudent reserve for a church of Mannofield's size. In 2008, we are in danger of having to break this policy and to use some of this money to underpin deficits in the various Funds operated by the church.

Members are encouraged to give consideration to ways of rectifying this situation and insuring that we avoid a third straight year of deficits amounting to over £10,000.

Every year around 50 volunteers are required to help with the door to door collection and count during Christian Aid Week.
