

Dear Friends

On the whole I like to encourage more of an outward attitude to our living than an inward one. It can become very inhibiting to our sense of spirit as an individual and our sense of mission as a congregation when we become overly focussed on ourselves; when our contemplations become immersed on self-feelings and self-preservation.

However, if there is ever a season of the church year when a digression from this way of thinking is allowable, it is the season of Lent. Indeed I would argue that it is very helpful for us to spend some time pondering our existence and objectives with inward focus. Clearly, to be effective in the outward expression of spirit and faith, we need to be soundly prepared within

From Ash Wednesday to Easter itself the Church worldwide recognises the value of looking inward. Traditionally for some the season is a time of fasting and prayer; the mood can seem sombre and reflective and the colour of the season (like Advent) being purple encourages a sense of penitence and assessment.

Lent also leads us to the possibility of looking forward to doing things in a new way. As we approach Easter itself the encouragement becomes the focussing of our wills and our energies on a longing for God's presence and a desire to live in His ways.

I would encourage each one of us to use Lent and the prescribed focus of the scriptures of the season to spark a time of assessment within our living as we ponder on the goals we set for ourselves and the type of witness we make as a congregation.

We are called to witness to the risen Christ in every aspect of our lives, witnessing to God's presence in the world and responding to God's call to Discipleship.

Letter from Alisa

Dear Friends

In light of the recent events at Queens Cross Church and Aberdeen Presbytery, events which have appeared in our newspapers, entered our conversations, and hopefully wrestled in our minds, events all sparked by the calling of an openly gay minister. I have been asked frequently about how the Presbyterian



Church USA (PCUSA) is progressing in resolving the same issue. So, I thought I would take this time to explain the moves being made in the PCUSA, moves to love all of God's children while remaining faithful to the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Our General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church meets every other year in the summer to review and establish national and global mission programs, to lead interfaith and ecumenical dialogue, to promote spiritual renewal and evangelism, to work for peace and justice, to reflect on social issues such as hunger, mental illness, immigration, and other special groups and to lead the church in providing disaster relief. These are only a few of the ministries carried out through the work of the General Assembly, similar to the Church of Scotland.

In addition, the PCUSA General Assembly has responsibility for maintaining the constitution of the church, which includes our two governing books, the Book of Order and the Book of Confessions. The General Assembly reviews recommendations from Presbyteries to amend the Book of Order and sends any recommendations approved by a majority vote of the Assembly to the Presbyteries for their consideration and vote. Any change in the Book of Order must be approved by the General Assembly and then by a majority of our 173 Presbyteries, which span the whole of the United States.

Over the past thirty years, there have been discussions at every level of the church, from local congregations to the General Assembly, about ordination standards for elders, deacons and ministers of word and sacrament. Many of these discussions have centered on the question of whether or not practising and self-affirming gays and lesbians are eligible for ordination to church office.

In 1996, the General Assembly and a majority of Presbyteries approved amending the constitution's section on ordination to include what is commonly known as the "fidelity and chastity amendment," which requires that those called to office must practise "fidelity within the covenant of marriage of a man and a woman or chastity in singleness." Prior to this amendment, the constitution did not single out any particular aspect of morality such as sexual behavior, but spoke more generally by saying that those called to office should live a life that is a manifestation of the gospel in the world. This summer, the PCUSA General Assembly acted to recommend to the Presbyteries an amendment to the Book of Order that would return to more general language about the moral standards of those called to ministry.

The proposed amendment states that those called to office

"...pledge themselves to live lives obedient to Jesus Christ the Head of the Church, striving to follow where he leads through the witness of the Scriptures, and to understand the Scriptures through the instruction of the Confessions. In so doing, they declare their fidelity to the standards of the Church."

For this amendment to be passed, a majority of the 173 PCUSA Presbyteries must approve it. The amendment can then become part of the Book of Order. This might seem like a minor change, but this difference of wording has been a result of a task force committee formed eight years ago called Theological Task Force on Peace, Unity, and Purity of the Church. The goal of the task force has been to bring together people of opposing sides to study and prayerfully discern how to maintain peace, unity and purity within our denomination. For the Church of Scotland, the PCUSA, and the church universal, this is a complicated issue with a long history. It is important that we deliberate prayerfully, thoughtfully and respectfully on this issue. Christians in good conscience with good theological and biblical reasoning may disagree with one another.

We have much to learn from listening with appreciation to each other.

So, for the next two years Presbyteries will be voting on the wording of this amendment.

But, what is important for the PCUSA, the Church of Scotland, and all believers in Christ is to seek love over hate, peace over division and respect over contempt as we prayerfully discern God's calling for the church and all her people in today's world.

The service this year has been prepared by the women of Papua New Guinea. The graphic they have chosen puts two symbols together: the cross and the bilum. The bilum is used by both men and women in a



multitude of ways for carrying everything from babies to heavy loads. Where cultures are so diverse, this simple string bag is common to many. The women of Papua New Guinea place the bilum on the cross. They seek a unity where they are not merely held together as though they were gathered into a string bag. They seek a vibrant unity where the several thousand separate communities are of one heart and soul.

In Papua New Guinea we are many and we are diverse. Our 800 languages represent as many cultures and traditions. Our rugged landscape can isolate us from one another but the love of God empowers us to embrace one another and to embrace you, our brothers and sisters around the world."



In Memoriam

lan Davidson

lan was a man who made a huge amount of his life, who was gifted beyond measure and who contributed a huge amount to others.

lan was born in San Francisco, arriving in Aberdeen in the early1930's. He attended Aberdeen Grammar where he was Dux. He went on to Aberdeen University to study for a BSC and Bachelor of Law.

After working for a while with Messrs Paul and Williamson, Solicitors he changed path and entered the teaching profession. He taught at various schools, most notably Rosehearty Secondary School where his friend Max was deputy headmaster. Ian retired in 1983. Those who worked with Ian would testify to him being a gifted, highly intelligent and caring individual.

lan was a long-time Elder of the church in Mannofield. Not only did he carry out his duties as an Elder with absolute dedication, but he also carried forward the work of the church in other ways too. He diligently marked 'Young Worshipers League Cards' at the Church door and most importantly for many years ran the camera club. In that capacity he managed to pass on his enthusiasm and skill in photography to others including many of the young people of the church and of the Youth Organisations.

lan will be a huge loss to this congregation. His influence reached far and wide and Mannofield Church has benefited hugely from his involvement in congregational life.

LENT

Lent is the period of forty days which comes before Easter in the Christian calendar. Beginning on Ash Wednesday, Lent is a season of reflection and preparation before the celebrations of Easter. By observing the forty days of Lent, Christians replicate Jesus Christ's sacrifice and withdrawal into the desert for forty days. Lent is marked by fasting, both from food and festivities.

Whereas Easter celebrates the resurrection of Jesus after his death on the cross, Lent recalls the events leading up to and including Jesus' crucifixion by Rome. This is believed to have taken place in Roman occupied Jerusalem.



The Christian churches that observe Lent in the 21st century (and not all do significantly) use it as a time for prayer and penance. Only a small number of people today fast for the whole of Lent, although some maintain the practice on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. It is more common these days for believers to surrender a particular vice such as favourite foods or smoking. Whatever the sacrifice it is a reflection of Jesus' deprivation in the wilderness and a test of self-discipline.

Why 40 days?

40 is a significant number in Jewish-Christian scripture:

- ♦ In Genesis, the flood which destroyed the earth was brought about by 40 days and nights of rain.
- ♦ The Hebrews spent 40 years in the wilderness before reaching the land promised to them by God.
- Moses fasted for 40 days before receiving the ten commandments on Mount Sinai.
- Jesus spent 40 days fasting in the wilderness in preparation for His ministry.

Most Christians regard Jesus' time in the wilderness as the key event for the duration of Lent.

Why is it called Lent?

Lent is an old English word meaning 'lengthen'. Lent is observed in spring, when the days begin to get longer.

The colour purple

Purple is the symbolic colour used in some churches throughout Lent, for drapes and altar frontals.

Purple is used for two reasons: firstly because it is associated with mourning and so anticipates the pain and suffering of the crucifixion, and secondly because purple is the colour associated with royalty, and celebrates Christ's resurrection and sovereignty.
