John's Gospel contains many passages that begin with the words, 'I am'. These verses are metaphors to help us understand the person and work of Jesus Christ. One of my favourites is when Jesus says of himself, 'I am the true vine'. (John chapter 15)

The vine is a familiar image in Hebrew scripture. Vineyards were important to the agricultural life of the area. Extensive work was needed to prepare the ground and the vines were protected from thieves and animal predators. The prophets of the Old Testament often associated a successful harvest as a sign of God's pleasure; therefore we can assume that this indeed is how the humble vineyard owner of the time assessed his standing before God.

Jesus called himself the 'true vine', identifying his followers, then and now, as the branches. The branches are only strong when connected to the vine; the branches bear fruit when remaining in contact with the vine.

The metaphor of the vine is a very simple one. I guess that each one of us has a clear understanding of what it is trying to say.

Jesus calls on us to remain in him. Without Jesus Christ we can do nothing.

I am certain you won't hear any arguments from a Christian about the truth and value of this statement. But I often query the exclusiveness of such an interpretation. Are we saying that without Christ we are nothing? What of people who have no religious view - who have no attachment in their own mind to Christ? What of people of other faiths where Jesus is not recognised as overly special in the context of their standing with God?

For me it's quite simple. When Jesus died and was raised to life He was rightfully proclaimed 'Lord of all'. Easter was not in any way exclusive. It was not for some; it was not designated only for a few. Easter was for the whole world and for all eternity; for every person and every generation.

For the Christian, Jesus is Lord of life. He is the vine that sustains us and nourishes us. We are lucky – for we know this to be true and we meet Jesus half way in our relationship with Him.

For those who count themselves non Christian – we Christians must surely believe for them that Jesus is still their Lord – even if they themselves don't make that connection.

In Jesus God has showed his hand – and it is a hand of love. God's love reaches out to everyone and for those who don't or can't meet him half way surely God stretches out his hand of love and seeks to draw them into His embrace none-the-less.

In my book, each person in the world is loved by God and Jesus came and died that all might have life – that all might feed from God's Love and be fruitful in right living.

Jesus did this for those who believe, and also for those who struggle to believe in Him. For me when He says He is the true vine – He is making a statement of fact that is less exclusive than it is inclusive. Jesus is Lord of all!

There is a rhythm and pattern to the creation story in Genesis. As the creation unfolds, God declares that each new aspect of creation is good. The word occurs like a refrain throughout the story. On the sixth day, God declares everything that is made very good. Not only is each element of creation good, but the inner harmony of the whole earth with its times of light and dark, its seasons of growth and rest and its animals, plants and minerals is very good. The



creation is a beautiful gift of God that manifests both resilience and fragility.

Here at Mannofield we have a newly formed Eco-Congregation Committee to help us as individuals and as a congregation be more faithful stewards of the earth. What our Minister Does? Day two in the Life of our Minister

9am I find myself at my desk at the beginning of a working week. My usual pattern is to turn my thoughts to Sunday. I find a theme for the Sunday Service I am preparing. Sometimes this is based on the Lectionary Readings for the Week or I choose a theme first then search for Readings from the Bible that will give me access to the Bible's 'Word' in that theme or issue. Having found my theme I prepare the Order of Service - choosing Hymns to match the theme. Having done this early in the week it allows the theme to work away in my mind as I carry out my other tasks before further planning for the service and the preparation of the material itself later in the week.



10.am I also take time to think ahead to the various Easter services and plan out some service content

10.20 am I prepare a Tribute for a Memorial Service later in the day.

11.00 am I visit the Dentist for a check-up.

11.45 am I complete my prayers for the Memorial service.

12.00 -12.30 Lunch

12.45 pm I leave the house and call in via the Church to pick up the hospital lists for the week. The last few weeks have been decidedly odd in that there have been very few names on the list. In my time in Mannofield it has been common to have four or five names on the ARI list and the same number on the Woodend list. In the last month we have had one name on these lists in total and one other lady I know of in Roxburghe House. While this is good news I am slightly concerned because there is a chance that others from Mannofield have been in and out of hospital, yet their names are not being recorded on the lists in the hospital. Patients or their families need to let the hospital know that they wish to be recorded on the Admissions Form as being a member of Mannofield Church – otherwise they will not appear on these lists that Ministers use to make the appropriate visits.

1.30-2.10pm I conduct a Memorial Service at Aberdeen Crematorium.

2.30–4.00pm After this I visit Woodend hospital for a single visit to the person named on my hospital list and then I head out to make calls at two Nursing Homes where a total of seven people are resident. I also manage a house call to someone bearing an illness at present but I don't stay long as a visitor from a distance away has arrived at the house at the same time.

6.45pm In the evening I first head off with my Presbytery hat on to attend a meeting of a Nominating Committee shortly to embark on the hunt for a new minister. My role along with two others is to advise the group on how to go about this important task.


8.15pm I manage to drop in for the last part of a meeting of our own Mission and Outreach Committee that was re-formed recently and is preparing for some work in the coming months.

9.00pm Home

All in all quite a productive day and as is mostly the case I am satisfied with what I have achieved.

Christian Aid's history





1940s

In the aftermath of World War II, British and Irish church leaders met, determined to do everything possible to help European refugees who had lost everything.

The name they gave themselves was *Christian Reconstruction in Europe*. Their purpose was not to evangelise, but to alleviate suffering for ordinary people, no matter what their faith. Christian Reconstruction in Europe became a department of the British Council of Churches, and was eventually renamed the Department of Interchurch Aid and Refugee Service. In a decade, it raised £29.000.

1950s


Janet Lacey became president in 1952. Christian Aid began to look beyond Europe and expanded its remit to support development work in newly independent nations in Africa and Asia, and respond to emergencies worldwide. It was involved in the creation of Voluntary Service Overseas (VSO) - an organisation dedicated to sending skilled volunteers to work in the developing world - and providing grants for Palestinian, Chinese and Korean refugees.

It made sure that the public was aware of continuing problems in the world by organising the first Christian Aid Week in 1957, and by famously building a replica of a refugee camp in the church of St Martin in the Fields in London. Since that first Christian Aid Week five decades ago, the little red envelope has dropped through literally tens of millions of letterboxes.

2000s


The 21st century has bought new challenges to Christian Aid. The so-called war on terror, climate change and the increasing number of natural disasters, and the fact that almost half the world's population live on less than \$2 a day, means its work is needed more than ever. In 2007 its annual income was £86.5 million and it now works with more than 650 overseas partners in around 50 countries.... putting into practice its aim of turning hope into action. But 60 years on from its founding, the fact that its still here isn't a victory. The world isn't getting any fairer.

Children in Gaza are going to schools pockmarked with bullet holes. Parents are selling their daughters in marriage to earn the money so the family can survive a drought in Afghanistan. Life expectancy for women in Zimbabwe is now 34 years - it was 65 just a decade ago. The income of some multinational companies exceeds that of entire countries. So Christian Aid won't stop now. It will carry on tackling the causes of poverty. It will continue to support local organisations to deliver real, practical change. It will work so that everyone can fulfill their right to a decent life.




Looking at the stack of dice on the left, can you work out which numbers are on the top and the bottom?














A mother was preparing pancakes for her sons, Kevin 5, and Ryan 3. The boys began to argue over who would get the first pancake.
