

### YOU ASKED FOR IT!

Last month I asked you to let me know if there was a particular theme or issues that you would like me to tackle in a sermon. Thank you to those who contacted me with suggestions.

I have six topics to address in the weeks after Easter. Below I offer a description of the challenge and the dates when the theme will be tackled.

**18 April 10am:** How can we explain 'Suffering' in the face of a Loving God?

**25 April 10am:** Jesus and the Cleansing of the Temple and its relevance for Mannofield as we explore how we might use our buildings in order to relate better to the community around us.

23 May 10am: The Second Coming of Christ.

**30 May 10am:** The Lord's Prayer. How to make sense of the closing line, forever and ever' and reflect on what this tells us about God's reign in creation given Christian religion has only existed for such a short period compared to creation and indeed humanity.

**13 June 10am**: The "Equality and Diversity" debate currently a hot topic in light of Biblical teaching and the different views held by the Roman Catholic Church and the Church of Scotland.

20 June 10am: Forgiveness

Just over a year ago a Development Committee was formed because Session felt that a detailed look at the church and halls was required. The passage of time had taken its toll, not simply with the fabric, but also the appropriateness of what we have to suit the future needs of the parish.

Architects were contacted and ideas discussed. After interviews were conducted Bruce Ballance of Mackie, Ramsay Taylor was instructed to carry out a feasibility study. Detailed surveys were done of the whole site and buildings and practical problems with the current accommodation identified.

This led to draft plans being presented by Bruce Ballance to a joint meeting of Session and Board on 23 February. The outcome of the meeting was overwhelming support for the ideas proposed and approval given to the Development Committee to take matters forward.

Having reached this stage it is now time to let everyone know what is proposed. The church was looked at in sections and problems identified.

### The problems:-

- 1). <u>The Countesswells Road door area.</u> This area is cramped somewhat claustrophobic and not welcoming. The kitchen is isolated and only services the Large Hall.
- 2). <u>Large Hall.</u> Accessing other parts of the church from Countesswells Road requires access through the hall, interrupting activities. There is a lack of storage space. The layout needs modernising, with more flexibility of use.
- 3). Rooms 1 and 2. It is felt that the current rooms do not provide the best accommodation for user groups.
- 4). <u>Sanctuary.</u> All agreed that this area is currently the best area, but is hardly used over the course of a week. The sanctuary is the 'hub' of all we are about as a Church. It is a 'Holy' place and generates holiness throughout the rest of our buildings and all our activities. Such a special place should be used as often as possible and shared with many more people, allowing them the opportunities to glimpse something of the holiness of God. Retaining its ambience and sacred feeling the committee wishes to find ways to use the space more fully and open it up so that hall users are enabled to sense the sacred as they access our suite of halls for any purpose or activity.
- 5). Remainder of our site. The Centenary Hall is felt to provide good accommodation but is isolated. An area of available ground where development could take place was identified which would provide additional space to accommodate meetings and activities for which we currently do not have space. A key objective would be to create a café style space which would serve teas/coffee and Fair-trade products to encourage members of the local community (young and old) to visit our church during the week.

### The proposed solutions

You will have the chance over the next few weeks to scrutinise the plans as displayed on boards in the Large Hall but in relation to the problems as previously numbered the proposed solutions are:-

- 1). Creating a new door and reception area making the area brighter and more welcoming. Provision of better office and vestry accommodation and providing an access door into the sanctuary from this entrance.
- 2). Providing a corridor to give proper access to other areas without going through the Large Hall. Creating storage and providing dividing screens to allow flexibility of use.
- 3). Moving the kitchen through to this area, enabling provision of catering to all areas of the church. Creating meeting rooms of good size for various uses.
- 4). Creating flexibility by removal of pews and provision of moveable staging that could be used for specific events. Providing better access by creating doorways at each Chancel (under the stained glass windows). Improvement of the front entrance hall making the sanctuary more welcoming.
- 5). Constructing an additional area on the Great Western Road side to provide a bright meeting area with a servery for teas/coffees. Flexibility of use created by provision of dividing screens.

Please come along and see the plans for yourself. It will be much easier to appreciate the changes when viewed on a larger scale drawing.

Members of the Development Committee will be on hand after the Sunday morning services over the next few weeks to explain or discuss the proposals. The outline drawings that you see will naturally require more work. A lot more detail will be added prior to any official proposal being made to the congregation, presbytery and '121'. We hope however that the work carried out so far allows you to imagine the type of accommodation we are seeking to create.

Overall the aim of the Committee is to make our Church the focus of our parish. We want to encourage as much use of our buildings as possible while retaining the idea that we are, first and foremost, a Church. The Sanctuary would become the heart of our site, more visible no matter which entrance you came in by and hopefully more appealing to those not used to entering a church.

#### The cost

A reasonable estimate would be between £1million to £1.5 million

#### Is it achievable?

That is down to all of us; not just a committee, but each and every person associated with Mannofield, every parishioner and beyond. While outside sources of funding will be sought, a significant amount would require to be raised from our own resources.

Any journey starts with one step. Some require that step to be a leap of faith. The Development Committee believe that with everyone's support and enthusiasm this can happen.

On 17 February 2009 the Kirk Session agreed that the Church needed to review its accommodation to ensure that we would "leave a legacy of a suite of rooms which were fit for purpose for future generations." Grand words maybe, but, when you get the chance to inspect what has been produced from work over the last year, we hope you will agree that proposals come close to achieving that. We hope that you become enthusiastic for these plans. support the changes and join us so that we can all make that leap of faith. as one Mannofield family.







Q If you could travel back in time, where would you go?


A I would visit an inhabited Skara Brae

As a lot of you will know I am now working full time at Mannofield. This has been a great boost to my work with the young people. This has strengthened my bond with them as they now know I am officially committed to them full time.

The youth café has undergone a bit of a change as the age range of those who are being attracted to this aren't really interested in coffee etc. and so it is now a youth drop-in. The age has also been lowered slightly to primary seven which is to take advantage of the Primary school being closer to the church than the Academy.

Thanks to all who have helped with this venture so far, you have done a great job! I have been very encouraged watching you interact with and join in games with the young people and I know they have appreciated you. It has been good for them to spend time with you and get to know you all a bit more.

It is hoped soon to get a Saturday night youth music project going based at the church and run in partnership with the Council which has made funding available for this. The project is to offer music tuition and support to young people and hopefully leading to some performance and recording opportunities.

Part of my plan for the youth work is to go to young people where they are at, instead of waiting for them to walk through the door of the youth drop-in. Although many young people will do that there are a lot of them who, unless there is a stepping stone in-between, won't even attend a youth event hosted at the church as there is a stereotypical 'block' of the church being seen as being for old people. So I'm looking into doing some street youth work and also as part of my work volunteering at the Friday night youth club held at Airyhall Community Centre.

With the increase in hours my remit as youth worker has also been extended to having some responsibility for children's work. As part of this I am now going into Airyhall Primary School where I hope to start an after school craft club for Primary 5+.

My work in the Academy is also expanding. Soon a lunch time CU (Christian Union) will be starting. I am also looking into a morning prayer time as well as providing some form of support to stressed teachers!

Thanks again for all your support so far. There is a good bunch of young people associated with the Church and I would encourage you to pray for them and offer a word of encouragement when you can.

### Mannofield Book Club Book for May


### The Book Thief by Markus Zusak


