

THE MANSE

Dear Friends

Each one of us belongs to a family. If we have the time many of us research the genealogy of our family, a hobby that has become more widespread in the era of the Internet and the birth of Ancestry web sites. Such studies of the relationships of our past family, root us in a history that build up the sense of who we are and where we have come from.

Most of us also have a strong sense of the relationship we have with those members of our family who share time and life with us in the present. Our life is grounded in these relationships and they foster a deep sense of belonging.

Jesus came from a family too and his ancestral line is well documented in scripture as is the closeness of His relationship with His mother, father and brothers and sisters. He speaks warmly of His family and reveals a clear sense of what it means to be a son and brother.

What is interesting too, however, is that when He speaks, He also indicates a strong sense of appreciation of what it means to be a parent. And yet He is not a parent – well not in the sense we talk about.

As the writer of John's Gospel reflects on the life and death of Jesus, he writes about Jesus saying goodbye to His friends. There is tenderness and sadness, bewilderment and reassurance. John quotes Jesus saying, "I will not leave you orphaned." It is as if this 33 year old man is a father. When Jesus chooses to speak as a parent to His friends, He demonstrates that family is more than a mother, father and children. He encourages us to open our eyes to families that are created not by biology but by love.

A "Family created by Love" is another name I think for "Church". Congregations are born not out of biological relationships but relationships of love. Sometimes these relationships are very clear to the observer. At other times both the members and the observer would struggle to identify much depth in the widespread relationships within a church family that ought to be grounded in love.

We are called to be more than biological parents, children, brothers or sisters. We are called to reveal the compassionate heart of Jesus and provide a welcome of love to strangers and friends, for all belong to the family of God.

Carolyn Pogue is a writer and editor living in Calgary, Canada and she writes:

Childless

Today I saw a childless woman: She was holding a child Gently by the hand. He was showing her a butterfly wing he had found. She was smiling, And listening carefully. I saw she was a teacher. He a student nine years old. And when I saw that childless woman, my heart was lifted. There are always enough children to go around. There are never enough mothers.

The Manse continued

At the end of Jesus' life we see in Him a recognition of the hurt and confusion that His death will cause His friends. But, like a parent who loves his children, He offers reassurance, "Peace I leave with you. My own peace such as the world cannot give."

With God's Spirit to inspire us may we pass on love and assurance to each person and by our attitude and actions help all God's children feel part of the family of the Church and of God. Best Wishes *Keith*

Church of Scotland Consulation Paper on Samesex Relationships and the Ministry continued page 12

The 2009 General Assembly appointed a Special Commission with the remit of consulting with all Presbyteries and Kirk Sessions before reporting to the 2011 General Assembly.

The remit was the following:

"For the sake of peace and unity of the Church the General Assembly:

.... To prepare a study on the Ordination and Induction to the Ministry of the Church of Scotland in the light of issues (a) addressed in the report welcomed by the 2007 General Assembly: "A challenge to unity: same-sex relationships as an issue in theology and human sexuality", and (b) raised by the case of Aitken *et al* v the Presbytery of Aberdeen and to report to the 2011 General Assembly.

A Special meeting of Mannofield Kirk Session was held on 11 May to consider and discuss the issues raised in the consultation paper. Fifty members of Session attended from a total of 97, a 51.5% turnout.

The outcome of the exercise was the following

2. Approaches to Same-Sex Relationships

a) Do you hold a clear position on same-sex relationships and how they should be regarded or do you find yourself uncertain as to the precise nature of God's will for the Church on this issue?

Clear position - 32 Uncertain - 18

b) Do any of the following descriptions help you to summarise your present position fairly and accurately? If not, how would you describe where you stand on the issue?

(i) We regard homosexual orientation as a disorder and homosexual behaviour as sinful. Gay and lesbian people should avoid same-sex sexual relationships, and, ideally, seek to be rid of homosexual desires. Unrepentant gay and lesbian people should not have leadership roles in the church. **No votes**

(ii) We accept homosexual orientation as a given, but disapprove of homosexual behaviour. We do not reject gay and lesbian people as people, but reject same-sex sexual activity as being sinful. Gay and lesbian people in sexual relationships should not have leadership roles in the church.

4 votes

(iii) We accept homosexual orientation as a given and disapprove of homosexual behaviour but recognise that some same-sex relationships can be committed, loving, faithful and exclusive – though not the ideal which is male-female. However, because of the different standards required of those in Christian leadership, gay and lesbian people in sexual relationships, even if civil partnerships, should not have leadership roles in the church. 9 votes

In Session......with Scribe



The future development of Mannofield Church again figured prominently on the agenda for the Kirk Session meeting on April 27.

Plans have been available for inspection by members of the congregation for some time now, but have still to be fine-tuned and funding issues resolved before the congregation is given an opportunity to vote on the issue.

Consideration is also being given to raising funds for the project and on this matter, helpful discussions with experts in this area have taken place.

The various committee reports submitted to Session had a common factor in that all recorded successful events in their respective spheres of activity, and this extended to the Alpha Course report, which indicated that a further course will take place next January.

Also looking ahead, Alisa intimated that on the last Sundays in June, July and August, the Messy Church group would meet when craft work would be followed by a meal and Bible Study. The assistance of volunteers would be required on these occasions.

Under Presbytery Matters, John Telfer reported that Keith had been appointed interim moderator at St. Fitticks Church, and that Rhoda Wright is to be attending this year's General Assembly, as is Tim Still, our Youth Worker. As a footnote to John's Presbytery report, it was indicated that a successor to him as Presbytery Elder has still to be found. There is another change in the Session ranks with Dr. Ian Hunter announcing his retirement from active eldership. Tribute was paid to lan's dedication to Session duties over a lengthy period.

The next Session meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, June 1 at 7.30pm.

ON THIS DAY 30 June: King James Version of the Bible 'approved'

The result of the Hampton Court Conference (1604), it was the work of English



scholars who used the *Bishops' Bible* and other earlier English versions as a basis.

Often called the 'authorised version', no formal authorisation was given to it, neither in England nor Scotland. However, with its degree of accuracy and felicity of language, it fairly soon came to be the accepted translation among English speaking people – replacing *The Genevan Bible* generally used in Scotland.

The 'AV', many of whose words and phrases owe much to William Tyndale's translation (made about 1526), has woven its way into the lives of countless millions and has done much to shape the English language. It is still in considerable use, and its inherent dignity of language is preserved in some modern translations, including the New Revised Standard Version by James in 1611.

It was a closely contested night but in the end *Generation Brigade*, the BB team won





(iv) We accept homosexual orientation as a given and accept homosexual behaviour as equivalent morally to heterosexual behaviour. Civil partnerships provide the best environment for loving same-sex relationships. Gay and lesbian people, whether in sexual relationships or not, should be assessed for leadership roles in the church in an equivalent way to heterosexual people. 22 Votes (v) We accept homosexual orientation as a given part of God's good creation. The Christian practice of marriage should be extended to include exclusive, committed same-sex relationships which are intended to be life-long. Gav and lesbian people, whether in sexual relationships or not. should be assessed for leadership roles in the church in an equivalent way to heterosexual people. 14 Votes

3. Ordination/leadership in the Church

a) Should those ordained as ministers or who have other leadership roles in the Church be held to a higher standard of Christian living than those not in such roles? If so, in what specific areas of Christian life should higher standards be kept? Yes -16 No -30 Abstentions-4

b) Should a person in a same-sex relationship be permitted to be an ordained minister within the Church? Why/why not? Yes - 34 No -15

c) Should a person in a civil partnership be permitted to be an ordained minister within the Church? Why/why not? Yes - 40 No - 9

d) Should a person in a same-sex relationship be permitted to have a leadership role within the Church? Why/why not? Yes - 36 No -13

e) Should a person in a civil partnership be permitted to have a leadership role within the Church? Why/why not? Yes - 41 No - 8

4. The Unity of the Church of Scotland

a) In your opinion, how serious would it be if the Church were to ordain or to refuse to ordain people who were in committed same-sex relationships? Do any of the following descriptions help you to summarise your present position fairly and accurately? If not, how would you describe where you stand on the issue?

(i) We would regard a decision to ordain as equivalent to denying credal doctrines such as the resurrection or the incarnation. Consequently, we would consider it impossible to be a Christian while holding such views and consider them accordingly to be 'heretical'. ['Heretical' here denotes a view that contradicts the essence of the Christian Gospel and thus the substance of the faith as it is expressed in the creeds and confessions of the one worldwide church.] Votes – 0

(ii) We would regard a decision to ordain to be unjustifiable given the nature and character of the Biblical witness to God's purposes, but would not go so far as to describe it as being 'heretical'. Such a decision would nevertheless be a cause of deep-seated disagreement and personal disappointment. Votes - 7

(iii) We would not regard a decision to ordain or not to ordain as particularly significant for the life and faith of the Church. Votes -14

(iv) We would regard a refusal to ordain as unjustifiable given the nature and character of the Biblical witness to God's purposes. Consequently, we would view such a decision as a cause of deep-seated disagreement and personal disappointment. Votes –21

v) We would regard a refusal to ordain as equivalent to denying credal doctrines such as the resurrection or the incarnation. Consequently, we would consider it impossible to be a Christian while holding such views and would consequently consider such a decision to be 'heretical'.
