THE MANSE

Dear Friends

As a cloud of volcanic ash sits above the United Kingdom grounding the flights from all airports I ponder on the fact that nobody can actually see it with the naked eye. Radar images of the cloud resulting from the eruption of a volcano in Iceland are hard to come by hence leaving it unsafe for aeroplanes to fly.

Despite not being able to see it, we know it is there because of the signs of its presence. We know it must be there because of the effect it has on everyday life; in this case the grounding of aeroplanes.

God is a little bit like this cloud of volcanic ash. Often in church we ask the question, "How do we know God exists if we can't see Him?" It's a question that every child might ask but if we are honest even as adults we have cause to reflect at times on the fact that faith would be so much easier if we could actually get a glimpse of God.

But the thing is, we do get a glimpse of something which reveals that God exists. I believe that and I am sure you do too.

Faith is by definition that ability to trust our love to something even though we cannot see it for ourselves. In the case of the cloud of ash we trust it is there because we see the effect of its existence as aeroplanes are grounded. We learn to trust God is there because we see the effects of His existence in the beauty of creation, the variety and goodness found in most of human life and perhaps, above everything else, in the

love that comes to us from those who surround us with such warmth and feeling.

Even in the face of suffering and the agony we sometimes feel, God can reveal Himself to us as the comfort and strength we need to pull through these times.

God might not be viewed by the human eye but His love can be felt in the human heart!

Just Imagine.....Rhoda Wright

This is not going to be a litany of places visited and experiences but rather a small glimpse of the memorable, inspirational, thought provoking people and places for me in the Holy Land 2010



- Taking Communion in the Open Air on the shores of the Galilee. Meeting Jews, Palestinians, Arabs, and Bedouins who have hopes for a changed future and are working for that.
- Being searched before you get into your church. Living below a 7 storey building where the occupants throw waste, feathers, stones into your street or backyard.
- The Shepherds –did they walk into Bethlehem, up to Bethlehem, down to Bethlehem? Looking out on a city that is dilapidated, partially rebuilt and sad. Having the water supply cut off for weeks with no reason given. Standing for an hour to file past the place where Jesus was born.
- Joyously serving lunch to 24 in your home with the help of your sister, sister-in-law. Only seeing your husband and son once a month then that being denied for no reason. Fathers and brothers taken away in night time raids-no charges-no trial and all together in jails for up to 20 years. Where are their human rights?
- Being 16 miles from the Mediterranean and not being able to take your children to the beach. Running a crèche for 27 children with one indoor swing, a TV and not much else. Walking 3 miles to work on your fields (assuming you get through the barrier) because your husband has been taken away – so you leave your child in the crèche from 7am till 4pm.
- Meeting boys in a School for the Blind. Being from the Gaza strip one 6 year old only gets home once a year when a UN official escorts him through the checkpoints and borders. He's been there since the age of 3. The BB raised money and paid for an activity centre to be built. Aim is for the youngsters to be self sufficient and no burden to their families. Imagine standing in a classroom in this school while a 6 year old sings lustily "We shall overcome" Does he mean politically or personally? Not a dry eye amongst us including the men!!

Just Imagine continued

- Being in a Bedouin tent drinking mint tea and dipping hot flat bread into olive oil. Eating the traditional dish of spiced chicken and rice.
- Not being able to get an education because you are female.
- Wearing the full robes of a Bedouin and her mobile phone hangs on a cord down her back
- Having to get a permit to travel into the city. Living in the shadow of a 20ft concrete wall with armed guards in lookout points. Having your permit denied for no reason at the checkpoint. Needing an accompanier to ease your movements through the barriers in your own country.



• Sitting in a boat on the Sea of Galilee listening to the story of Jesus calming the storm. Under the

trees at the Church of the Beatitudes reading the Sermon on the Mount a verse each. Watching the boatman fishing in the traditional style. Singing hymns then totally silent meditation.

- Finding a flush toilet in the Negev Desert. Not being able to get an education unless you have your husband's or father's permission. Living in your tent/ home with jets flying low over all the morning. Having to learn a new language at 40 to be able to fill in a form or tell the doctor your symptoms.
- Looking at olive trees in Gethsemane which are 2000 years old and would have been growing at the time of Jesus. Looking across at the Dome of the Rock and the Aqsa mosque and visualising the Temple of Jerusalem. Seeing Roman stairs which Jesus would have used. The Garden tomb for me more moving than the Holy Sepulchre.
- Gobsmacked at the opulence of the hotel in Tiberias. Olives and chilli peppers for breakfast. At a service station in the Judean desert and finding 3 camels tied up. The cable car at Masada. A service in Arabic but the hymn tunes were the same. Raining just



before Shabbat so not many at the wailing wall. Flash floods washing away the road to the Dead Sea.

 Keeping my patience, not rising to the bait, making new friends, feeling the Guild could make a difference, panicking when you sink up to the knees in gloopy mud, tears of anger and joy, helpless laughter — all this and much, much more.



How refreshing and exciting to be part of a Church which is looking ahead positively.

As I hear people talking, I gather that the hall renovations are welcomed but the removal of the pews?

You may be interested to know that consideration to a major development at Mannofield was mooted prior to the millennium. At that time I was involved in a fact finding group visiting local churches which had already undergone significant changes to their halls and sanctuaries. All churches were inviting and prospering.

Each minister reported that the removal of pews had been contentious and had generated resistance from some members. However, they also reported that once the improvements had been completed there were no regrets. For Mannofield at that time, it was felt that a new minister would be coming and we should wait. We have now waited and the time has come for us to take a leap of faith.

We have generations who have never seen inside a church and these plans give people the chance to come to church, beginning their journey with a community interest which may just lead to the beginning of a spiritual interest.

Modern seating, apart from offering more comfort, would allow Mannofield to open its doors for use more often and by a wider group of people. This is an opportunity for the church to become a centre for the community, to be a meaningful part of the community at its very heart. All of this while maintaining the dignity and serenity of the sanctuary.

While I too have some nerves about such radical changes I do hope the efforts of the development committee will be embraced and that we, like many churches before us, can become a busy, thriving church which meets the needs and expectations of the citizens of the 21st century.

The Retiring Collections at the June Communions will be sent to the Aberdeen, Aberdeenshire and Kincardine Branch of the Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen and Families Association (SSAFA) Forces Help.



What is SSAFA Forces Help?

The Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen and Families Association (SSAFA) Forces Help is the national charity helping and supporting those who serve in our Armed Forces, those who used to serve and the families of both. This includes those who serve in our Reserve Forces and anyone who did National Service as well as close relatives, widows and widowers. Each year SSAFA provides assistance to more than 50,000 people. Any donation received by the Aberdeen, Aberdeenshire and Kincardine Branch, based at Gordon Barracks, Bridge of Don goes directly for local assistance. Over the past 12 months the Branch has considered 158 cases and disbursed some £2400 to needy applicants.

What SSAFA does

It takes action, on request whenever there is hardship, loneliness or need. The help given varies enormously; from financial assistance such as paying a heating bill for a widow or assistance with the costs of household effects, to help for children with additional needs and emotional support for the lonely, ill or bereaved. In all cases, the criterion for assistance is need. SSAFA's support and advice are completely confidential.

For those wishing to donate by Gift Aid, it is hoped to make envelopes available in the office, and at the front of the Church from mid-May onwards.

Mannofield Book Club - Book for June "The Return" by Victoria Hislop

From the internationally bestselling author of **The Island** comes a dazzling new novel of family betrayals, forbidden love and historical turmoil.

Sonia knows nothing of Granada's shocking past, but ordering a simple cup of coffee in a quiet café will lead her into the extraordinary tale of a family's fight to survive the horror of the Spanish Civil War.

Seventy years earlier, in the Ramírez family's café, Concha and Pablo's children relish an atmosphere of hope. Antonio is a serious young teacher, Ignacio a flamboyant matador, and Emilio a skilled musician. Their sister, Mercedes, is a spirited girl whose sole passion is dancing, until she meets Javier and an obsessive love affair begins. But Spain is a country in turmoil. In the heat of civil war, everyone must take a side and choose whether to submit, to fight, or to attempt escape.

We will discuss this book on Wednesday the 2nd June.
