THE MANSE

Dear Friends

I think one of my favourite episodes in the Bible is the account of Abraham being so bold as to interfere with God's decisionmaking processes as he seeks to change God's mind.

The description of this exchange is found at Genesis 18:20-32. In a quick summary what we have is God stating that he is going to tear down Sodom and Gomorrah because of their sin. Abraham intervenes putting forward the argument that if innocent people live in these cities, might not the cities be spared as it would be wrong to take the lives of those who are sinless.

God accedes to this request and agrees that if 50 innocents were found the cities would be spared. That's not enough for Abraham and he keeps the negotiations going reducing the number of required innocents little by little until ultimately God agrees if 10 innocents are found then the city will be spared. Let's not worry about the fact that these cities were destroved on account of fewer than ten innocents being found; the point of the story is God appears to be influenced by the pleading of Abraham.

This is wonderful news for us because it reveals a God who is not so distant from us or immune from our pleading that He is immovable in His emotions towards us or so reticent in His willingness to act as He receives our petitions. Our God 'never slumbers and never sleeps'. Although we cannot ever be 100% certain of how God will respond to our pleadings and our prayers, what we can be sure of is that He listens and He responds in love. God is not immovable.

He is as emotionally pliable as any loving human parent should be when their child unburdens their innermost feelings in open and honest conversation.

Let us then be persistent in our prayers and be confident that whatever we seek for ourselves, for our Church and for our world, can be taken to God in prayer.

Inviting young people to the Table..... Alisa Ferlicca

Our next service of Holy Communion is on Sunday 28 November. On this first Sunday of Advent we are opening the Table to the young ones of our congregation. By participating in Communion, a child, as well as youth and adults, experiences being accepted in the community of believers. Gathering around the Table of the



Lord which is a symbol of God's abundant and everlasting love, nurtures and strengthens our children. So, with this letter and useful teaching tips, I encourage parents and grandparents to sit down with their child in the weeks to come and discuss Communion.

Communion: many names for the same meal - *Holy Communion, Table of the Lord, Eucharist, Lord's Supper* and *Breaking of the Bread.* The church views Communion as a sacrament, which is a visible or tangible way of understanding God's grace. Understood as a gift from God in which we receive God's love and forgiveness, Communion is anticipated with joy and thanksgiving. It is an act of worship where we gather to celebrate Christ's life, death, and resurrection. Through receiving the bread of life and the cup of the new covenant, by the grace of God, we experience the presence of the living Christ.

Through scripture we are reminded of the role of meals shared with Jesus and of God's nearness to us in the sharing of bread and wine—(or grape juice.) Paul, a follower of Jesus, retells the words and actions of Jesus at the last supper in *I Corinthians 11:23-25.* Jesus used the most common items available to Him at a meal—bread and juice—and gave these things a special meaning. He asks us to take the bread and the cup regularly as a way of remembering Him and His teachings for our daily lives. A good discussion with your child is how she or he and you feel Jesus is important to your lives—a *remembering*. There are three other places in the Bible where you can find a record of Jesus' special meal with His disciples in Jerusalem.

See if you and your child can find them: *Matt* 26:26-29, *Mark* 14:22-25, *Luke* 22:14-20.

Communion, a meal of many meanings:

Remembrance: We remember God's acts of love toward us going all the way back through the OT stories of freedom from captivity to the NT stories of Jesus' life and teachings.

Thanksgiving: We give thanks and praise to God for the many gifts we have received throughout history and in our daily lives.

Celebration: We celebrate with great joy God's continuing presence with us, in times of joy as well as in times when we are hurting and receive strength and comfort.

Forgiveness: In Jesus' life, death and resurrection our brokenness is forgiven and healed. And when we come to the Table we are forgiven again and again. We experience God's forgiveness for things we have done wrong.

Inviting young people to the Table continued

Being Fed and Feeding Others: When we share in the bread and the wine or grape juice, we are reminded that as our needs for food, for God and for love are cared for, we are also called to offer to others the same care and love.



Belonging: Through baptism we become members of the Church, the body of Christ, in the world today. In Communion as we include people of all ages we reaffirm the covenant made at baptism and deepen the sense that we all belong to the people of God.

Faith is a lifelong process. Faith grows within as we worship God within a community of faith, giving praise and thanksgiving, when we hear and retell the stories of faith from the Bible, people in history and our own lives. It grows when we ask questions about faith for our daily lives. Just as we do certain things to care for our physical growth and well-being, so too, there are steps to help us grow spiritually.

You can do this with your children by telling the stories of meals Jesus shared with people (such as a "Meal with Levi" *Mark 2:13-17;* "A meal with Simon" *Luke 7:36-47;* "Road to Emmaus" *Luke 24:25-32;* "By the lakeside" *John 21:5-13;* "Feeding the 5,000" *John 6:5-14*). Exploring Bible stories with your children can be fun as well as informative. You may find these questions helpful in the investigation of the stories: Who was there? What took place? What did they have to eat? What did Jesus do? What did he say? Can you find the words "take", "blessed" or "give thanks" "broke" and "gave"? What is your favourite verse? Try drawing a picture of the story.

It is important that as a whole congregation we invite and welcome children to the Lord's Table. The experience is enriching for all. We all learn by participation in events and then reflecting on what we have done. Through the repeated act of Communion we grow in our understanding of the miraculous power, awe, mystery and joy of this sacrament and add new dimensions to our faith journeys as individuals families and communities. Share your personal reflections on the meaning of Communion with your child, or for that matter, anyone else because all are invited to the Table. When we meet at God's Table we are reminded that this was a special meal Jesus shared with those who followed Him and His disciples. There is no age restriction on following the Lord.

Building Development News A church at the heart of the community



We are moving to a crucial stage in the progress towards agreeing an appropriate plan for refurbishment of our buildings. An article in the September issue of InSpire outlined a timeline for the remaining part of the year and the Development Committee is now pleased to offer more detail.

On Sunday 28 November it is planned that during the morning service the Kirk Session makes its presentation at, what will be to all intents and purposes, a congregational meeting. The presentation will include three elements.

<u>Firstly</u>, the Vision we have for the future of our congregation particularly its relationship with the community;

Secondly, a description of the plan for the refurbishment of our buildings and

<u>Thirdly</u>, an outline of how we proceed with a fundraising campaign.

After this presentation the congregation in attendance will be asked to give backing to the proposals in the form of a vote. During the meeting the Kirk Session will be very clear that this vote is not so much a matter of merely giving approval to a plan; instead what the Session will be seeking is a pledge from as many people as possible that they adopt this Vision and plan, individually and collectively, and are prepared to do everything they can to make it a reality.

In order to allow for every member of the congregation to be informed of the details of the Vision and the plan, the District Elders will be asked to visit homes during the month of November, taking with them a leaflet which summarises the visions and outlines the building plans. The plans also will be available to study on display boards in a much larger form within the church during the weeks preceding this meeting.

Preparing and talking about new Vision and creating a plan for the future is of course all very exciting. At the same time it brings with it a need for the backing of as many of the congregation as possible. By congregation we don't just mean those who regularly are able to attend and participate in worship. We mean everyone who is a member of the Church and associated with our Church family. Whatever category you fall into, please now consider your commitment to the Church and your willingness to be part of a movement that could realise an appropriate ambition to create the best opportunity possible for furthering the best work of the Church for many years to come. We are asking those who may have fallen away from regular participation in Church life now to make an effort to renew their involvement. These plans portray a high level of ambition and a strong desire to be an active, purposeful Church with a strong sense of family and a focus on the community around it. Surely such a Vision can inspire each one of us and move us towards the desire to be part of it.

Our desire is:-

- To play a crucial part in the community by providing the opportunity and encouragement for people to worship in a friendly and supportive atmosphere.
- To capture the imagination of all generations living in our community and welcome them into active involvement within our Church family.
- To use the gift of our building and its situation to make our church a place of busy activity and a hub for care and support for the community around us.

This as a time in our history when we must plan for and build a legacy that will include a suite of rooms fit for purpose in today's society and for future generations too.
