

The first question is a lot simpler to answer than the second!





ARE YOU A CARER?

If you provide unpaid support to family or friends who could not manage



without your help due to illness, frailty, disability, mental ill health or a substance misuse problem then you are a carer.

VSA Carers Service offers a menu of services to carers of all ages.

Information on topics e.g. breaks from caring, practical help, housing options and advice on benefits including form filling and access to grants.

Complementary therapies such us reflexology and massage along with Counselling and Life Coaching are also provided.

Training programmes throughout the year on lifestyle management and emotional issues can also be accessed free for carers.

One carer who has recently used the service said, "As a carer you don't' realise the help you need. You think you just have to get on with it. It's not a failure seeking help. Getting help and support makes a difference to your own health. The happier you feel the more able you are to support the person you care for. I am a member of a generic carers support group. I have also attended excellent training courses for carers. I would encourage other carers to get in touch—get the first phone call done. It will open so many doors"



In Session With Scribe



The forthcoming redevelopment of our church buildings again figured prominently on the agenda at the October Kirk Session meeting.

There was encouraging news on the financial aspect of the project with the announcement that there is currently approximately £200,000 in the bank and with other committed sums, available funds have now reached the £300,000 mark.

Still on the financial theme, comparative figures showed general income from the congregation had increased and expenditure decreased this year compared to the previous one, but it was stressed that income had been boosted this year by one-off payments such as legacies.

Session agreed to take part in the Bethany Winter Shelters scheme which involves homeless persons receiving food and accommodation between November and February with churches providing seven-strong catering teams between 8 and 11.30pm.

Mannofield has been assigned three dates – 8 December, 22 January and 16 February. Helpers for the December date have already come forward but volunteers for the two other dates are asked to contact Keith as soon as possible.

Volunteers were also sought to cover the church secretary's absence on holiday from mid-November to mid-December.

Session granted a request from Mrs Sheila Murray to be placed on the Retired Elders' List and tribute was paid to the contribution she has made to the Church's work over many years.

It was also agreed that elders who had completed 30 years service in the eldership and had not received a long service certificate previously should be identified and presented with a certificate as soon as possible.

The next Session meeting is scheduled for Tuesday 13 December at 7.30pm.







Tributes....Peter Shearer, Kynoch Caldwell and Sandy Brown

At the October meeting of Kirk Session tribute was paid to three Elders of the congregation who had died in recent months.

Peter Shearer and Kynoch Caldwell, both retired Elders, gave considerable time and work to the church for many years. As Elders both were known for their excellent pastoral care and enthusiasm for the role of Elder and membership of the Kirk Session.

Alexander (known as Sandy) Brown remained a serving Elder up until his death in October. Sandy spent his early working life in Malaysia, before and after marrying Aileen in Mannofield Church in 1961. Returning home he undertook a course in management at RGU, and after a stint with British Steel living and working in central Scotland, he returned to Aberdeen to take up a position with Brit Oil (latterly BP) from where he retired. Sandy was a terrific worker within the community as a member of the community council and the local health board among other areas.

He was President of the church Men's Club for a number of years and an Elder of long-standing. Like Peter and Kynoch, Sandy was a most diligent District Elder who was a friend to many.

Mannofield Church has been well served by these three men over many years, They leave a legacy of faithfulness and care that will burn on for a very long time. The thoughts and prayers of the whole congregation are with their families.


Blythswood Care Shoe box appeal
