Dear Friends

The Year 2011 needs to be a year where we all work together and do what we can to support the Development Project. I want to say to you - that's okay! I understand the feelings that you have in relation to what you would <u>like</u> to do and what you feel you <u>can</u> do. But what I want to say to all of you is that we can all do something and that doesn't necessarily need to be a major financial contribution.

The important thing about a campaign such as we are running is that momentum is built up and that all are able to enjoy being part of something worthwhile. There are lots of things we can do this year. We can support the events that others organise or we can decide on something that we might offer by way of a fundraising initiative that we can undertake on our own or with friends.

If baking is your talent for instance – then by all means arrange a Sunday date where you can sell some home baking in the hall after church. It doesn't need to be only in the church that you host a fundraising event. If you are in a bowling club or other club maybe you could do something there and raise some funds. That way we are not always targeting the same people to dip into their pockets.

The point I seek to make at this time is that any effort that we are able to make, as an individual or a church group, towards this project - be it a financial gift or a gift of your particular talent - is hugely appreciated. My encouragement to you all is to give some thought as to what you can do and then if you come up with an idea speak to the Fundraising Group who will assist you to get on and organise it.

In Session......with Scribe

The future development of Mannofield Church was extensively debated at Congregational meetings held in November and December.

The December gathering was deemed necessary as the November one produced a low attendance due to adverse weather conditions. It was perhaps significant, however, that the voting on the development proposals produced a similar outcome in each case.

At the first meeting, the voting count was 96-3 in favour of the proposal to support a fundraising campaign with a view to achieving the proposed redevelopment, while additional votes at the December meeting backed the proposal by a 52-8 margin.

The Kirk Session meeting on November 30 was also informed of the impact that proposals for cost reduction are having on Presbytery planning. The 2003 plan is to be revised, with a minimum reduction of seven ministries achieved.

A consultation process on Presbytery planning is under way, and we in Mannofield should be prepared to put forward our views when we are visited by Presbytery representatives. The aim is to have the revised plan completed by 2012.


On a more domestic topic, Session has agreed to reinforce its ranks by the introduction of new Elders. Session members have been asked to nominate possible candidates for Keith to approach.






These two pictures may look the same, but can you find ten differences?

All Honour Due

This week I read a beautiful legend about a king who decided to set aside a special day to honour his greatest subject. When the big day arrived, there was a large gathering in the palace courtyard. Four finalists were brought forward and from these four, the king would select a winner.

The first person presented was a wealthy philanthropist. The king was told that this man was highly deserving of the honour because of his humanitarian efforts. He had given much of his wealth to the poor.

The second person was a celebrated physician. The king was told that this doctor was highly deserving of the honour because he had rendered faithful and dedicated service to the sick for many years.

The third person was a distinguished judge. The king was told that the judge was worthy because he was noted for his wisdom, his fairness and his brilliant decisions.

The fourth person presented was an elderly woman. Everyone was quite surprised to see her there because her manner was quite humble as was her dress. She hardly looked the part of someone who would be honoured as the greatest subject in the kingdom. What chance could she possibly have when compared to the other three, who had accomplished so much?

Even so there was something about her; the look of love in her face, the understanding in her eyes, her quiet confidence.

The king was intrigued to say the least, and somewhat puzzled by her presence. He asked who she was. The answer came,' You see the philanthropist, the doctor and the judge? Well she was their teacher!'

The woman had no wealth, no fortune and no title but she had unselfishly given her life to produce great people. There is nothing more powerful or more Christ - like than sacrificial love.

The king could not see the value in the humble lady. He missed the significance of the teacher.

Often we miss the value of those around us. I think it would surprise us to know how often we miss the presence of Christ, just as Cleopas and his brother missed the significance of the stranger on the road to Emmaus. *Anon* Where there is no vision the people perish'. I read these words many years ago in a Lillian Beckwith story, uttered by a loving but inarticulate uncle as he was seeing his niece off at a railway station. Stuck for something fitting to send her off with he resorted to familiar text from the Bible. [Proverbs 29:18]

The circumstances made me laugh at the time but in some prophetic way these words have shaped my life ever since.

At university, in the midst of all the socialising, looking for a path for the future; bringing up my own family, trying to give them the skills and confidence to make their own way in life; in my teaching career, trying to establish an environment which would nurture and stimulate the hundreds of children who passed through our doors -- there was always a need for vision.

I don't know if you remember, but some years ago, before Keith's time, Mannofield Church had a Quinquennial visitation. While we were praised for the many things that Mannofield does extremely well, we were chastised for having no vision and no 5 year plan in place.

But here we are in 2011 -- and we **do** have a vision -- *Mannofield at the heart of the community*, and we **do** have a plan to make it happen.

So let us go forward into the future with faith and confidence, doing our best to make the vision for Mannofield Church come true.

Hillwalking club Saturday 26 February Inverbervie to Johnshaven circular (OS 45)

Depart from Mannofield Church at 8:00. Start at the beach car park in Inverbervie (NO833723) and walk up through the town then up a track to Benholm.

Pass the old church on the left and follow another track on the left to a road junction at NO794681.

Go down this road to Johnshaven.

Follow the coastal path north through Gourdon back to Inverbervie. (10 miles; 4.5 hours)

The walk can be shortened by going downhill directly from Benholm to the coastal path (7 miles; 3.5 hours). Return to Aberdeen at 16:00.

The Club has an annual programme of walks, mostly in the Cairngorms and the Angus Glens and welcomes new members. A typical walk would be 9 to 12 miles with an ascent of 2000 ft, taking 6 to 7 hours, but easier walks can be arranged. If you have never walked in the hills but would like to try the experience, walking with a group is the best way to learn how to tackle the mountains and build up your confidence.


