### Home Communion

The ministers are very happy to be invited to visit homes in the



congregation to celebrate Home Communion.

Very often people tell us they really miss being able to get to church especially on communion Sundays.

A Home Communion is an opportunity to share in a short act of communion in your own home. The minister brings with him/her the bread and wine and a small communion set with cups. Very often the district elder is invited along too but this doesn't need always to be the case.

The minister introduces the short time together with a reminder of the story of the 'Last Supper' and consecrates the sacrament with a prayer. After this, communion is shared and the time together is finished with the minister leading a prayer. There is no formality to the short service yet at the same time it is a poignant moment to share in one of our Christian traditions that means so much to us in our faith.

## THE MANSE

Dear Friends

The beginning of the season of Lent doesn't announce the fact that Winter is over and Spring has arrived. That would be wishful thinking. I'm sure 'Mother Nature' has plans for some wintry weather still to come our way.

What the beginning of the season of Lent does is to announce the **promise** of Spring. As we pass Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesday and enter headlong into Lent – day by day, week by week we begin to have a sense that soon, very soon, winter will be over for another year and Spring and then Summer, will bring with it something new – something warmer and perhaps, if we are lucky, a glow of sunshine.

Lent is not about the final destination. Lent is a journey. It is the awakening to the promise of God that He loves us and will reveal something wonderful to us.

In the Lectionary, the focus story for the first week of Lent is God's promise to Noah and his family. This promise is set out amongst the clouds – distant, elusive, beautiful, fleeting but also reliable and regularly present in the right conditions. It is the rainbow, of course, and Noah and his family look to it as sign and symbol of a binding connection forged by God. It is God's own personal reminder, to them and to God, that the ties between them will not be broken.

In the weeks leading to Easter, I hope you notice the 'rainbows' in your own life. The reminders are all around you of the Love that God has for you.

These rainbows are discovered throughout life: the love we know and treasure, the remarkable people we encounter who reveal love and kindness, the incredible sights found in the created world and the richness of blessing we enjoy in the company of others.

In this Season of Lent let us open our eyes to the *rainbows* that life produces that are constant reminders of the great **promise** God makes to us – that He loves us with His whole being. Then as Lent ends and Easter begins – like the spring and summer that follow winter – that promise is fulfilled in God's Son as He accepts His death because He, and God, love us completely.

#### Mannofield Church...130 years old and still counting

#### THE FOUNDING OF THE CHURCH

Extracted from "A Century at Mannofield — The Story of a District Church" 1882-1982

Continued thanks are due to all those who contributed to this excellent historical record especially Arthur McCombie, Fred Thomson and Alastair Macdonald.

Housing was only slowly filling up the district. Brighton Place was half-filled, but there were only two houses in Forest Avenue. On Great Western Road, houses had spread



as far as Forbesfield on the north side. There were four houses past Gray Street on the south side and only isolated houses lay farther west mainly beyond where Anderson Drive now crosses

Most of the names familiar to the present residents of the district were then in common use. A glance at a map of the district reveals names like Kenfield, Craigielea, Louisville, Newlands, Craigiebuckler, Burnieboozle, Braeside, Airyhall, Beechhill, Springbank, Viewfield, Johnston and Annfield. These, however, were not the name of the avenues, roads and terraces which are well-known to us today. Then they were large suburban residences, often used as retreats from the city during the summer. The practice by the wealthy citizens of Aberdeen in Victorian times of withdrawing in the summer from the unpleasant, unhealthy atmosphere of a poorly drained city plays its part in the founding of the church at Mannofield. It brought into contact the two men most closely connected with the enterprise.

It was in this thinly populated area that it was proposed that a new church should be placed. At first, it was claimed that there was 1000 of a population to be served by the new church, but this claim was later reduced to 800, of whom, it was later admitted, only half belonged to the Established Church of Scotland. The number of communicants in the first year of Mannofield's existence turned out to be 92. A note of optimism had been struck at the beginning of the Mannofield story, because the tramway system was spreading westwards and the feuing for new houses was increasing.

On the outskirts of the town, in keeping with Scottish practice, it was common for the eminent men to be associated with the name of their estates and so, one comes across the names of Archibald Duff of Annfield, Thomas Douglas of Airyhall, John Couper of Craigiebuckler and so on. It is the last-named that one has to turn for the beginning of the story of Mannofield Church.

John Couper was one of several interesting Aberdonians in the mid-19th century who foresaw the rewards that awaited men of initiative and enterprise in the Far East. He had started life in a modest way, serving his apprenticeship locally in the shipyards of Alexander Hall and Co.

He made his way to the East as a ship's carpenter and there he recognised the great possibilities of development in Hong Kong, where he set up a ship building and graving-dockyard and prospered exceedingly. It was because of this enterprise that the name of Aberdeen is still applied to part of the Hong Kong area.

In 1863, John Couper returned to Aberdeen, bought the Craigiebuckler estate, and took up residence in Craigiebuckler House, now the headquarters of the Macaulay Research Institute (since 2011 the James Hutton Institute). Stories were told of his hair-raising adventures as a Chinese prisoner. Only a remarkably strong personality could have survived such ordeals.

Resettled in Aberdeen, he busied himself with many business ventures, including the Suburban Tramway Company, and as a pillar of the Established Church, he encouraged the move to establish a church in his own district. Thus in 1873, the church extension scheme in Aberdeen was begun by the setting up of an "iron church" at Craigiebuckler at Couper's own expense. It stood not at Walker Dam but at Slopefield on Countesswells Road near the present entrance to the Macaulay Institute. This was a so-called Chapel of Ease, a church whose powers were limited and restricted.

Affairs then moved quietly along until 1880 when a petition from the Rev. Wm. Forbes of Craigiebuckler for the setting up of a new church at Mannofield was presented to the Presbytery of Aberdeen. The most interesting point of this petition was the location proposed for the new church – not the one we associate with Mannofield Church now, but at a spot near Beech-hill, at the intersection of the Pitfodels Road and Springfield Road (not far from the present Airyhall library and the west gate of Springbank Cemetery).

It has been already suggested that it is difficult to see much justification for the building of the new church in 1881, and when one realises that the two churches of Craigiebuckler and Mannofield were originally to be situated so closely to each other, the case seems to become weaker.

Why then a new church?

We will continue to look back at the founding of the church in future editions of InSpire

#### In the service of Christ for 125 years -The Church of Scotland Guild extracted from Life & Work January 2012 CONT. from Feb InSpire

In the last ten years of the 19th century, the Guild was laying the Foundation for the very real social working and support that it is renowned for today as well as allowing women across the country the chance to fully realise their talents in a huge variety of ways.

Charteris died in 1908, but his legacy by way of the colossal social a c h i e v e m e n t bequeathed by his vision to the church, remains with us to this day. Since the Guild's centenary

in 1987, the Guild has opened its arms to offer men a place within the organisation too, changing its name in 1997 to 'The Church of Scotland Guild'.

In the same year they launched their three-year strategy programme; a way of selecting six projects and working with them raising money for them and supporting them over the course of three years.

In that way projects and programmes selected were given three years of Funding that they could use to build on and move forward, a 'backbone' of income they could rely on.

Each three year cycle another set of projects is chosen and hundreds more people around the world give thanks to the benevolence of the Guild. The projects selected by the Guild are voted for by members before every strategy. To be chosen as a Guild project is a highly sought honour. In a time of straitened finances, the Guild funding can be a lifeline and a chance to develop. Projects selected through the years have been



incredibly diverse but all have as their foundation the chance to put the Church's love into action wherever it's needed and to do God's work whenever it's needed.

There are about 28,000 Guild members throughout Britain, with branches all the way from London to Shetland and in churches everywhere in between. There are now over 300 male members of the Guild – now with a new General Secretary, Iain Whyte.

The Guild keeps up its tradition of innovative ways to include and involve the community and harness the strength and resolve of women across the country. In 2008 Guild week was marked by their 'Chain of Peace', where Guilds were encouraged to pass candles and a prayer of peace to other members, be they Guilds, councils or congregations.

The Guild are behind the huge blossoming of interest in the creation of banners in churches throughout Scotland, thanks to their Millennium banner exhibition tour in 2000.

One hundred and twenty five years later the Guild is still playing a massive role in church women's, and now men's lives.

The work they do is unsurpassed by almost anyone else in the Church family and their contribution to the life of the Church is beyond compare.

#### MARY'S MEALS ----THE GUILD GOES BACKPACKING

From a throwaway remark of "We could do that" to nearly 50 assorted backpacks for Mary's Meals.

We managed assorted backpack sizes and shapes for boys and girls aged 4-12 years. Half the Guild ladies arrived with completed bags and the "Spares" were collected on the tables. After an hour and a half packing and a "cuppa with a rowie " Kathleen Martin (front left) and her daughter took everything home to



finish off. Those ladies who couldn't manage to supply items gave donations to buy missing essentials.

Mary's Meals is a global movement that sets up school feeding projects in some of the world's poorest communities, where hunger and poverty stop children from gaining an education.

Mary's Meals began by feeding 200 children in Malawi in 2002. Today, they feed over 600,000 children every day in 16 different

countries across Africa, Asia, Europe, South America and the Caribbean.

The idea is a simple one that works. They provide one daily meal in a place of education in order to attract chronically poor children into a classroom where they gain an education that can, in the future, be their ladder out of poverty.

After reaching the milestone of feeding half a million children at the beginning of 2011, the continued generosity of Mary's Meals' supporters has since enabled an extra 100,705 children to receive a daily meal in their place of education.
