Message from Keith

In my ministry I have found myself thinking a lot about bricks, mortar and buildings. My ministry in Bearsden involved discussions about what to do with the two church buildings there and soon we were in the fortunate position of being able to extend the newer one. My ministry here in Aberdeen has similarly focussed a lot on our buildings.

It would be easy at times to think that church life is mainly about upkeep of buildings. With my Presbytery hat on I appreciate the amount of money that the congregations of Aberdeen spend on fabric repairs. It is a constant battle for many keeping their buildings wind and watertight — not to mention making them appropriate for vibrant ministry.

Bricks and mortar aside, we could even recognise that much of our time in congregational life can leave us very insular. It's natural to be protective about what we have, seeking at all costs to maintain a style, tradition and collective friendship with which we are comfortable.

Sometimes this becomes a preoccupation and it can be easy to lose sight of what is truly possible when we allow ourselves to let go and be led by the spirit.

Our Narrative Lectionary Resource (for which I do some writing) has this sentence in an introduction to season's material: "God this intends not for us to be settled people fortifying our lives with brick walls and impenetrable doors but to be journeying people, nomads in a world that is going somewhere..." This is a helpful reminder at this time of the real reason behind all our hard work. It is not for the sake of the building itself (although protecting heritage is increasingly important in a fast changing modern society) that we work so hard. We are not content to create a monument that is something to look at and be comfortable in. It is not a place intended to provide enclosure from the outside. Once refurbished the building should allow us to journey with more effectiveness in an outreach to the community. Together we step out faithfully, sometimes to unsettled as we explore new ways of doing things but knowing that under God's Spirit He will lead us somewhere.

Development Update

We move closer and closer to commencing work on the Building Development in the middle of this year. We have been fundraising for some years now and the generosity of the congregation and friends of the congregation has been astounding. Mention should also be made of the hard Development working Fundraising Committee which has been extraordinarily faithful and committed the to task undertakes in your name.

Last year we had two pledges made by anonymous donors that were made in the form of a Match -Funding offer. In both cases we not only achieved the target figure but surpassed it. At the end of 2014 the Development Fund was almost £1.2 million. As this update arrives through your letterbox the Committee will have met the Design Team that has produced the 'Bill of Quantities' for review. Once approval is given to that by Historic Scotland/ Heritage Lottery Fund this will be sent to contractors as a Tender document as we look to appoint the Team who will become our partners in this exciting project. After many years and much effort by many people we are now very, very close to embarking on the long awaited construction work to rejuvenate our buildings.

Creative Worship Group

In September we launched a new group that adds a creative dimension to our Sunday Worship. As we followed the stories of the Old Testament we made a Rainbow to remind us of God's promise of protection.

Various people contributed dramas, reflections and music to the service as we journeyed with God's people on a figurative pathway to the fulfilling of the prophets' dreams for God to come. Again in the season of Advent and Christmas, members of the congregation got creative. Advent Clocks helped us count down the time to Christmas but also reminded us that God gives us 'Time' — and we pondered on what God wants us to do with it.

We continue to get creative in our worship through this session and we will soon prepare for the new season beginning at the start of Lent. Anybody can come and be part of this creative group that uses art/ crafts, music, drama and oration to add flavour in worship. Look out for news of the planning meeting to take place at the beginning of February. Details of the day/time will be added to Facebook and the Web Page.
