Dear Friends

I have been doing a lot of writing this week and including this letter I calculate that the total number of words written in four days will be around 10,000! My English teacher would give me a Gold Star for effort but as for quality others will have to decide over the course of time.

The reason for this writing is that in the early part of 2013 I was invited to join a writing team that produces Worship Material called 'Spill the Beans'. The deadline for the January to March material is the end of September and I have just about finished my contribution. Add in the Sermon and Prayers for this Sunday's Service (which have been written) and the word count total is complete.

In our day-to-day personal lives we recognise the importance of 'words'. Communicating with our fellow workers, neighbours, strangers and family is something we do constantly through the course of any day. Choosing the correct words is important. Avoiding the wrong words is probably even more important.

'Words' inform our knowledge. We are grateful for the books we have read, and the newspapers that update us and the words spoken on radio, on stage, on television and film that entertain us.

Without 'words' the story of the Christian Faith would not have reached us. Two thousand years on from the birth of Christ we are thankful that through words the story of Jesus' life is as alive now as it ever was. The correct words have been spoken to us and not only have they

made some sort of sense for us and resonated with our personal life experience, they have touched our hearts.

'Words' we know have a strong impact on our lives.

But perhaps the last 'word' in all of this is best left to a writer far more astute than me – the writer of the Gospel of St John, who writes,

*"Before the world was created, **The Word** already existed; he was with God, and he was the same as God"*

We have used and heard many 'words' across our lifetimes, but there is only one '**Word**' that has existed with God since the beginning.

John's Gospel presents Jesus as the eternal **Word** of God who became a human being and lived among us. Jesus maybe died on a Cross but He was raised to life and exists in the World today. The **Word of God** is alive and is active in the World today. It is something we must seek and something for us to live by.

For the **Word of God** and all it expresses provides for us the best 'words' of all. Best wishes *Keith*

Bible Study Group


The Bible Study Group meets on a Thursday morning from 11am until midday in Room 1. We are using the 'Pray Now' booklet produced by the Church of Scotland.

Think global, act local - Church Eco Congregation Committee RECYCLING AND LIGHT SWITCHES



It's well known that we in the developed world consume more than our fair share of the world's resources, whether that be minerals, food or energy. We also throw away quite a lot, whether it's food past its "Best Before" date, or sometimes just to keep in fashion. The result is a steady depletion in the earth's natural resources, massive landfills around our cities and, almost certainly, adding to climate change.

You might think that there's little you can do to change all that. But you'd be wrong, because it's only through the small actions of everyone that meaningful change will come about.

The new Eco Congregation Committee has been busy over the summer with a couple of quick, easy actions. You may have noticed that the recycling collection bins around the Church halls have been given a facelift. So if you have any waste paper, if it's dry pop it in a recycling bin. There are also the usual bins for metal cans, provided, of course that they are empty (sugary drinks make an awful mess). Finally, there's a new opportunity to recycle plastic containers; but please rinse them first, because milk makes a bit of a pong after only a day or two!

Try counting the number of light switches and bulbs in our rooms and corridors. It's quite a lot, and the "please switch off the lights" notices were becoming so familiar as to lose their impact. So to save electricity, we've renewed the lot.

The Eco-Congregation Committee now has a strategic plan to guide its work for the coming few years.

Thank you for your help. Every little bit makes a difference and, just to get you started, the woolly hat pattern is below

PATTERN

Using No 4 mm knitting needles cast on 100 stitches

K1, P1 for 3 inches

Change to 1 row Purl and 1 row knit for 5 inches

Then decrease as follows (on every knit row only)

K9, K2 together to end of row

K8, K2 together to end of row

K7, K2 together to end of row

K6, K2 together to end of row

K4, K2 together to end of row

K3, K2 together to end of row




Thread wool through remaining stitches and sew up.





Church Book Club OCTOBER 2013


Family Life


