

Dear Friends

Living in our City next to the sea we are very much aware of the abundance of water on our doorstep: water that provides a livelihood for fishermen and others; water that creates a network for travelling from one place to another; water that conceals a rich abundance of carbon products deep below.

Water of another sort is equally abundant as we turn on our taps and drink or use it for our daily needs.

How easily we forget that water is a precious gift of God to all people. Particularly hard to remember I imagine for those folks at risk of flooding - the result of heavy rainfall south of the Border in recent weeks!

How easily we forget the 'gift' of water. As in the developed countries of the world, we use and often abuse it as a commodity in industry; often causing its pollution and so decreasing availability of its pure form to us and others.

Environmentalists, marine biologists and those who are part of the Eco-Church sound out a warning to the world concerning the dangers of abuse of the natural resources around us. Perhaps water - apparently abundant yet fragile nonetheless - is one part of creation that we would do well to consider as something sacred.

This year, no sooner than we leave Christmas behind, Lent arrives and the Christian Year takes us on a journey towards Easter. As we take part in this journey we can prepare for Easter by remembering that Jesus in His life and by His death, came to the World to be the 'Living Water'.

Just as we at times take the abundance of water in our world for granted – so often we forget the needy in the world and take for granted the peace and comfort that people know in their lives. All of us at times have need of God – some more than others – and it is in this season that we can find signs that point to the response that God made in Jesus to the needs of people the world over and in every generation. The Love that people need is in the world, yet it is often not shared in the way it should be!

Let us learn to drink from the well of God's 'Living Water' and work on becoming better stewards of the water in our homes, communities and world and also more productive stewards of the water that is God's Love, which equally needs to be looked after, protected and shared more evenly throughout our world. In Session..... with Scribe

At the time of writing this and since the last instalment of "In Session" appeared in the October issue of "InSpire", Kirk Session had met twice, but the second of these meetings was a joint one with the Congregational Board in mid-December for the purpose of hearing from the consultant advising us on our future approach to Christian stewardship, and, as such, did not include purely Session business.

The November meeting of Session, however, produced the customary range of discussion topics.

The Moderator, reporting that an advertisement for an Associate Minister had been published in Life & Work with a closing date for applications in December, also outlined the procedure for such an appointment.

Mr. Blackwood also congratulated the Woman's Guild and the Boys' Brigade on reaching their respective centenaries. Session were informed that the Guild would be marking their centenary year with the presentation of a new pulpit fall and new pew bibles.

Although the decision to dispense with the pew linen for the November Communion services had produced a few unfavourable comments, the general consensus seemed to be in favour of this and other Communion changes. Another change agreed by Session will see the number of formal Communion services increased to three each year. The dates of these services have still to be decided.

Session were informed that currently three districts were without a district Elder and it is hoped that the vacancies will be filled by volunteers from among the Elders who don't have a district at the moment.

On financial matters, Session agreed to donate £1,000 to the International Nepal Fellowship.

The next Session meeting was arranged for Tuesday, January 15 (look out for a report on this meeting in the March edition of "InSpire").

One of the biggest frustrations of working in Nepal, and indeed any developing country, is the difficulty in getting things done. Our telephone wire is a good illustration. It snapped on Christmas day. The wire had been strung so tightly between 2 far distance poles that it finally gave way under the strain. We phoned the repairs number on our telephone bill and the helpful lady said she would send someone along to fix it. Well somehow that did not seem to happen, but I kept phoning and soon the helpful lady knew my name and number before I had progressed beyond 'Namaste'. After 2 weeks she suggested it would be helpful if I were to come to the office to meet Mr. Karnal the telephone repair man. She couldn't tell me why meeting Mr. Karnal in person would help him repair the line, but always happy to oblige I jumped on my bicycle and went off to meet him. He explained the unfortunate news that Nepal Telecom has run out of telephone wire. When I went back to the hospital I had a chat with Ganga, my trusty office PA. 'So how much money do you normally give the telephone repair man?' said Ganga. I had to admit that it had never crossed my mind to give him any money. 'There's the problem' said Ganga. We're not dealing with a telephone repair man so poor that he can't feed his family. He's a state employee with a job for life and with a pension thrown in. I've no intention of paying him a bribe, but we may also have to get used to the idea of not having a phone.



It's been mentioned before but one of the most difficult parts of our job is selecting who we admit to hospital. Back in May we decided to admit a young boy of 19, Ishwar Darjee to the ward. He had fallen down a terrace and had a high neck injury leaving him tetraplegic. He had been languishing in another hospital without any treatment and we admitted him to Green Pastures and put him in a striker frame with traction on his skull. I know that many of you prayed for his recovery but it did not happen and his family took him home.

He was left in an animal shed for 5 months and came back to Green Pastures in December in a dreadful state. Despite our best efforts we could not retrieve the situation and he died last week. Should we have admitted him in the first place knowing that his long term outcome was so poor? Sometimes it's good just to acknowledge that we are working for an all wise and all knowing God and

"Sing to the Lord a Joyful Song"

What does it mean to worship God?

We worship God in all sorts of different ways - in devotional ways, in personal ways, in practical ways. One way that historically the Church has Worshipped God is through the use of music and singing in church. Hymn and Song writers over centuries have sought to capture something of the nature of God, and composers of music have used their skills to put such sentiment to music.


When it comes to singing these hymns and songs, for those gathered in worship, there is a sense of personal devotion in singing the words as we conjure in our minds a picture of God's nature or activity in the world; and in singing hymns (like any social singing) there is also that sense of being pulled together in a united voice of shared feeling.

During the months ahead I would like us to 'retune' ourselves to the glory of the sentiments expressed in our hymns and to push ourselves a little harder as we seek to sing out and make a 'joyful song to the Lord'. My experience of the Christmas services was that as a congregation we tried a little harder to sing out these familiar hymns at top voice with the result that our worship was ignited with a spark that is sometimes absent.

Perhaps we settle into habits that leave us going though the motions instead of truly participating in worship individually and collectively in a way that leaves us and others changed by the experience. This is not a criticism of the singing in Mannofield. It is merely the observation of somebody coming in to this congregation from the outside and having a sense that as a congregation we have settled into a pattern in our signing of hymns that if challenged a little, might introduce (like a fine wine) a flavour to our worship that is a little more full-bodied!

To help us concentrate our minds on worship in the next couple of months, during February a survey is going to be conducted as to the congregation's favourite hymns. Forms will be available on Sundays later in the month and after Easter the results will be collated and the 'top-of-the-pops' of our Hymns will be revealed at an Evening Service in April. The results of the survey will also provide us with a list of favourite hymns that will be incorporated in our worship services and which we can all sing with great 'gusto' as we praise God.






In this building there are 8 inmates, One in each cell.



Some of you will remember Fyfe Blair, a probationer with us some time ago. He went on to take up his first charge in Fife before coming back to Aberdeen as minister at Cove for a few years. From there he moved to Dunedin, New Zealand, where my husband and I met him recently.



We arrived, unannounced, at his parish church one Sunday in November to find that it was the first time that year that he was not taking the service. The duty elders were very concerned that we meet him, and we were hurried across the road to their outreach centre where the regular breakfast meeting was ending. There was just time for him to recover from the shock of seeing us, to say "Hello" and to arrange to visit the Blair family at home, before we had to get back for the service. The church is a large and attractive one; the congregation friendly and there is a buzz of activity around the place. The parish is a large one, the result of a voluntary amalgamation a few years ago of two parishes. They have moved into one set of premises and the final change to a new name for the combined charge will be completed soon. They kept two ministers (although there is a vacancy at present), with Fyfe concentrating on outreach and development and the other on church based congregational functions.

The Blair family are living in a privately rented house but hoping to buy their own soon. Apparently ministers there have the choice of having a house provided, or having the rent paid for one of their own choice, or being paid a housing allowance if they decide to buy their own. I expect our own finance and fabric committees would welcome a similar system here!

Fyfe, his wife Gillian and daughters Rachel and Anna are all well settled into their new life and thoroughly enjoy it. They send their best wishes to all at Mannofield.

The Sailor's Society (ex British and International Sailors' Society) is calling on knitters to join its campaign and help break the 2007 record of 15,000 hats.



The Woolly Hat Campaign provides seafarers arriving in the UK, often ill-prepared for our weather, with hand-knitted hats to keep themselves warm during the many months they are at sea. The Society replaces isolation with belonging, amongst some of the world's 1.2 million seafarers, through a network of Port Chaplains stationed in almost 100 ports internationally.

Last year's Woolly Hat Campaign saw over 15,000 hats distributed to seafarers throughout the UK and to Russia, Antwerp and South America, with over 6,000 given as part of Christmas packages. The Society aims to break this total for the year and encourage people to knit woolly hats for a good cause.

Away back in the 1950s a young family bought their first television set. Several neighbours came to help with the installation. Some went up on to the roof to fix the aerial. However they had only a few meagre tools that would not do the job, so they came down.

On the doorstep stood a young couple who had only recently moved into the neighbourhood. They had a large toolbox which contained every possible tool for every possible job. The volunteers selected the proper tools, went back up on the roof and in no time the aerial was fixed. Everyone crowded into the living-room to watch the knowledgeable one twiddling the knobs. Suddenly there was a clear picture and excellent sound. They thumped each other on the back and shook hands.

One of the women present said to the man with the toolbox, "What exactly do you make with all these tools?"

He smiled and said, "Friends."

What a lovely idea.

Of course, don't we all have within us tools of a sort which help us to make friends if we could just bring them to the fore at the right time?

A smiling face, encouraging words, a helping hand, a sense of humour, an uncritical attitude.

It is truly awesome when it begins to dawn on us that we have been "befriended by God."

When we read the Old Testament, it seems all the Promises of God, as written by the prophets, are for the Jews only.

Then we come upon a verse (and this is Isaiah 49.6) ".....I will make you a light to the nations so that all the world may be saved."

So we are included after all.

In Ephesians 3.6 GNB Paul asserts "...by means of the gospel the Gentiles have a part with the Jews in God's blessings."

I feel included and profoundly affected to read "I have written your name on the palms of my hands." Is 49.16 GNB I sometimes think the Saltire Society has as many aims and objectives as it has members! According to its constitution one of its main tasks is to "increase public awareness of Scotland's distinct natural and heritage in all its richness and diversity". The Aberdeen and North East branch of the Society puts it this way in its programme: of Scotland thought without languages, literature and music is too terrible to contemplate. The Saltire Society is fighting for the things we believe in".



The Society was founded in 1936 led by a group of Glasgow University academics.

One of the objects of the Society is to encourage creativity, inventiveness and the highest standards of excellence in Scotland's contribution to the arts and sciences. To this end the Society makes a number of awards the oldest of which is the Housing Design Award established in 1937.

The Civil Engineering Award made jointly with the Scottish Association of the Institution of Civil Engineers is an opportunity to recognise the highest standards in the design and construction of civil engineering projects. The 2007 winner was the "squinty" bridge over the Clyde, the Finnieston Bridge or Clyde Arc.

An important award is the Scottish Book of the Year. The 2007 award made on St Andrews Day was to A L Kennedy's "Day", a war story about Alfie Day, a Wellington rear gunner. Other awards include the Arts and Crafts in Architecture Award and the Science Award.





Recording of the morning service has been changed to 9.30 and the cassettes replaced by CDs. Anyone wishing to receive a regular copy of this service should contact our Secretary.


Supervision of all matters related to the sound system has been passed over from Barton Brown to Tom White.
