Dear Friends

Have you ever been the bearer of happy news?

When we have good news to tell generally speaking the heart-rate is increased, the Cheshire cat grin appears on our face and we skip our way to deliver the message to a recipient. I am sure we have all been in that position; it's exciting to discover something we know will make others happy!

Can you imagine the excitement of Mary Magdala?

Based on the account found in St John 20: 1-18 we can imagine how she felt in being a witness to the resurrection of Jesus:

"Hi. My name is Mary Magdala. I have some wonderful news for you! I can hardly believe it myself, but it's true."

In making her discovery Mary's heart must have been racing. She no doubt skipped her way to those she had to tell her story.

Mary was a figure from a marginalised group within the society of Jesus' generation but, as with other events in the Gospel, so often it was to such surprising characters that special insight was given and also the task of telling others about God. She was given a special privilege – not so much a secret – but an insight into the ways of God that promised Good News to the world. Mary responded with absolute faithfulness and played her part in witnessing to the vital news of Jesus' presence in the world despite His death on a cross.

Many scholars consider Mary an apostle of the church. She is mentioned in Acts along with other women who clearly played their part as messengers of Good News.

It is now our turn to be messengers of such Good News to the world.

As we approach Easter let's make the spirit of the season a revitalising force in our lives. Let it be so strong as to put an extra beat in our hearts and establish a smile on our faces. Let it give us the encouragement to skip our way to revealing, in everything we do in the name of the church and in our personal life, the Good News of God's life-giving spirit, alive in the world today.

As indicated in the last instalment of *"In Session"*, the Kirk Session have been considering a new schedule for Communion services in Mannofield. The January meeting of Session approved the introduction of three formal Communion services per year, on the first Sunday of October, March and June, with a less formal Communion on the first Sunday of Advent, in December. The new cycle will commence in June this year.

Another innovation linked with Communion is abandonment of the Communion invitation cards. In their place, elders will distribute appropriate literature to their district homes prior to each of the three formal Communion services.

Session were also informed that applications had been received for the post of assistant minister and interviews will be conducted in the near future.

Another new venture is the setting up of a social committee whose assignment will be the organisation of a number of social events in the course of the year with the aim of getting the congregation to mix on a social basis more frequently.

Roll keeper Jim Cardno reported to Session that our membership had dropped from 1593 to 1510 in the course of 2007. We welcomed nine new members, but 92 had been lost, most of them through death or families moving out of the area.

Elders reported on visits to the Crèche and the Mother and Toddlers' Group, and the Youth Worker updated Session on the various youth activities.

The next Session meeting is on Tuesday, March 18.

PASSION ON THE TELLY

During Holy Week 2008, BBC1 is to broadcast a major drama series on the last days of Jesus. It will be 'stripped' across the week, reaching a dramatic climax on Easter Sunday.



Passion tells the story from the viewpoint of Caiaphas, Pilate and the disciples. It is likely to be seen by up to 8 million viewers.

Director of the Churches' Media Council, Andrew Graystone, has held extensive discussions with *Passion* producer Nigel Stafford-Clark.

He said, "This is a straightforward account of the last few days of the life of Jesus told with honesty and passion. Obviously it is a work of drama not theology and wasn't conceived as an exercise in evangelism. It promises to be the most honest and challenging account of Jesus seen on TV in many years and will prompt believers and unbelievers alike to think about Jesus."

Award winning producer Stafford-Clark has commented: "The *Passion* is a gripping, multi-stranded dramatisation of not just the most familiar but arguably the greatest story ever told. Both truthful and simple, it gives it back to the audience in a way that will feel as fresh, contemporary and surprising as if it were happening for the first time."

Over a period of months we have gradually managed to get her legs straightened out and last week she started to walk using a special set of braces. At the moment her walking is cumbersome and difficult, but it's gradually improving as she starts to use her muscles for the first time. The novelty of being able to stand upright has not worn off and she is smiling a good deal more than before.



As you may already know we plan to return to the UK to allow Jenny to start secondary school after the summer. It might have been possible for Jenny to continue her schooling in Kathmandu, but the idea of being separated as a family does not appeal and I am keen to get back to general practice, a job that I love. I've been keeping an eye on the job adverts and as a result I will be coming back to the UK for a job interview in Aberdeen next week.

This year's service has been prepared by the Christian Women of Guyana on the northern coast of South America.

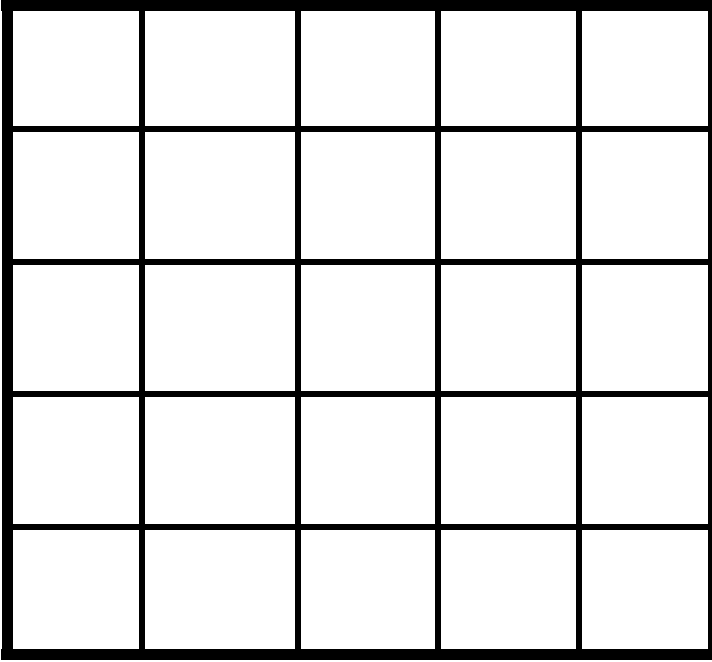

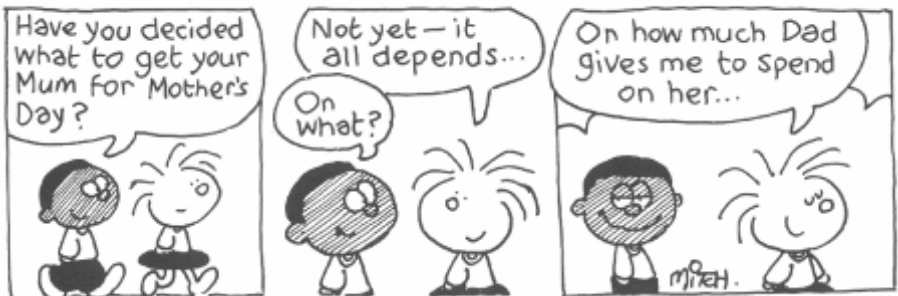

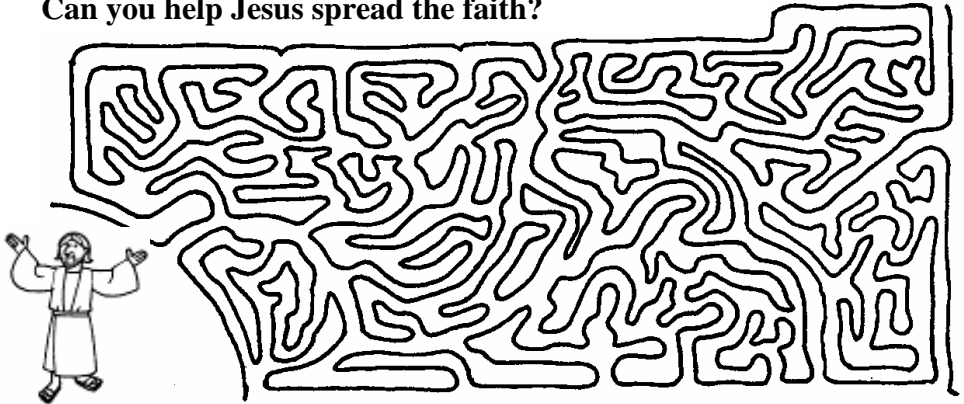

Ken Hancock of Stained Glass Radio North Sound 2 was the guest speaker at the Unity Prayer week supper at Mannofield Church on 23 January. His presentation included extracts from some of his broadcasts. This was both stimulating and challenging especially those which might be regarded by some as bordering on the superstitious with near death and post death experiences being recounted with passion and conviction.



Unfortunately it is not yet possible to download his broadcasts but for those who missed his talk and wish to hear his programme it is on Sunday between 9 and 10 pm.

Stained Glass Radio is a title that probably neatly sums up the mood of the programme -- *Music and chat with a Christian slant, but designed to appeal to a wide audience* -- not too serious, and so fitting in with the station's ethos but still dealing with complex subjects with respect and trying to be accessible to people who are not necessarily "church" people.

Ken is Chief Engineer for Northsound. He has been an Elder at the North Parish Church, Rhynie for the last 7 years but before that was a Jehovah Witness for 13 years. About two years ago he was approached by the station's programme controller and then the MD and asked if he would like to launch a Christian programme. This was an extremely unusual suggestion given that time is money in commercial radio. So he felt compelled to take up the challenge and did a pilot CD. The rest is history with SGR starting 18 months ago.

During that time he has experienced some very rewarding interviews. One of the first interviewees was David Pawson -- *Not as Bad as the Truth: Memoirs of an Unorthodox Evangelical, 2006*.

He would like to interview the leaders of the various denominations particularly Rabbi Jonathan Sachs. Ken has a tremendous love for the Jewish people and has a deep belief that as "Gods People" they will come to recognise the Messiah one day. His support for the British Messianic Jewish Alliance (an association of Jewish people who have found the Messiah as their Saviour and Lord) was passionate and full of conviction.

As Mannofield Church is conducting a survey to find out the congregation's Top of the Pops of Hymns I asked Ken what were his favourites. Classical hymns but with a modern approach:

BOOK REVIEW

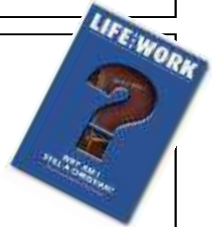
Rather than a book, it's the Church of Scotland's own magazine "Life & Work" that I'm reviewing this month.
