Dear Friends

Writing to you last year in December, I referred to the impending credit crunch and threat of recession. Perhaps we can't quite believe that we have been talking about such things for 12 months and probably even longer.

While we can't say for certain that the recession is over we can certainly say that together with war in Afghanistan, the ramifications of a slow-down in the economy have dominated the news during 2009.

I suspect we are all able to consider how these things have affected us. In a business sense and in personal ways I suspect we have all been affected by this crisis in some way. For some it will have been in a very specific and threatening way, for others less so.

As we look to 2010 I suspect that all of us are hoping that the worst is behind us and that we can look forward to more stable times for ourselves, family and friends. The experts tell us these things go in cycles. There are good times and there are bad times; there are times for investment and times for protecting what we have; there are times for speculation and times for sticking with the familiar.

One of our most known stories in the Bible is the story of Joseph – the one with the colourful coat! In the dream he interpreted there were signs of 7 years of full harvest and abundance and 7 years of famine and shortage predicted.

Joseph had the sense to persuade the people to make preparations to store up the bounty from the

good times so that they would have a source of food in what was to come. The story goes further than this, indicating that it was God who in the first instance would supply His people with what they needed so that ultimately no harm would come to them.

The Bible is littered with stories of how God provided for His people in threatening times.

As we prepare to celebrate Christmas we can take heart again as we are given a reminder of the ultimate provision of God for His people. When Jesus was born into human life, the world then and now was given a sign that while everything else in life may fluctuate and move in cycles, God's Love for us is stable and dependable. What's more, Christmas reveals that no matter how dark the threat around or upon us – the light of Christ and the quality and depth of God's Love for us is stronger!

Dear All.

I have now been here at Mannofield Church for around two months. I have met most people but if I haven't met you yet please introduce yourself to me during coffee time after the service or if you see me around in the office during the week.



I would like to thank you for your warm and friendly welcome and for helping me settle in and feel at home here with you.

I would like to let you know a little bit of what I've been up to and what I'm planning to get up to in the future.

I spent my first month just settling in, getting to know people and what happens when. My first task was to get a Sunday night youth club on the go which I've called Revolution. There is a chance for the young people to hang out together and play pool and table tennis before playing games together and this is followed by a Christian DVD or short talk. We started off my first Sunday with only two or three young people and now have ten which is great.

Within the next two weeks I am hoping to get an after school youth café on the go. This will be on Mondays 4.00-6.00pm and to make it a success I urgently need some volunteers to come forward for this and would be very appreciative of any help.

Research shows that in most parishes only 9% of the young people in the area are associated with the Church. It would be great if you would help me here to buck the trend and instead of 9%. let's reach out to 90% of the young people in the area!

I spend a lot of my time involved in chaplaincy duties at Hazlehead Academy where I visit guidance classes and also RE classes. In the New Year I hope to set up a Scripture Union lunchtime club.

I'm also involved at Airyhall Community Centre where I help with a Friday night youth club. In the New Year I hope somehow to get involved in Airyhall Primary School and also hope to establish a youth Bible study group.

So that's most of what I'm up to, as well as building links with youth workers at other churches.

Please if you can help in anyway with the youth café let me know. Both the youth and myself rely on your support.

In Session..... with Scribe

The future development of the Mannofield Church buildings, referred to in "In Session" in the October issue of "InSpire", took another step forward when the Kirk Session met on October 27.



The elders were informed that the Development Committee had appointed the architect firm of Mackie, Ramsay and Taylor to carry out a feasibility study on improvements that might be made to the buildings. Comments and observations received from individuals and organisations using the premises had been passed on to them and it is hoped that the study will be completed by the end of the year, allowing these matters to be debated further early in the New Year.

Also under discussion at the October meeting was the form of worship at Mannofield, with various suggested changes to the present format being put forward.

These included a balance of old and new hymns, with any of the latter being included for a few successive weeks to allow the congregation to familiarise themselves with them. Also suggested was moving the intimations to later in the morning service, with provision made to ensure that those leaving for Young Church were kept informed.

Tim Still, the new Youth Worker, was introduced to Session. He felt it was important to have wide-ranging activities to appeal to all ages of young people.


Under "Minister's Matters", Keith announced that a "Souper Sunday " will take place on January 10 in support of the Presbytery's bid to raise £15,000 for the Church of Scotland HIV/Aids Church in Society appeal.

The Social Committee will organise a soup-and-sandwich lunch and the Worship and Devotion committee will be involved in the service along with the Youth Worker and Young Church in an effort to raise awareness of and funds for, this project.

John Telfer, who has given long and devoted service as our Presbytery Elder, intimated that he is standing down. Any elder willing to succeed him is asked to contact Keith as soon as possible.

The next Session meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, December 8 (7.30pm).







In 1921 she had three young children and everyone warned her never to enter the prison. She said, "My husband and I are going to take care of these men and they will take care of me."

At the first game of basketball, she took her children along to watch. insisted on becoming acquainted with all the men in prison and studied their records. She discovered one was blind. She visited him in his cell. She took his hand and said, "Do you read Braille?"

"What's Braille?" She was able to teach him to read.

Later she found a man who was deaf-mute. She went to school to learn the sign language for his sake.

Many said that Catherine Lawes was the presence of Jesus that came alive again in Sing Sing from 1921 to 1937.

Then she was killed in a car accident

Next morning only the deputy warden appeared and the tragic news spread.

The next day, the deputy warden was shocked to see a large crowd of hardened criminals gathered at the gates of the prison, many of them weeping.

"All right men, you can go," he said. "Just be sure you check in again to-night." He opened the gates and the prisoners walked the three quarters of a mile to Catherine Lawes house to pay their last respects.

Then they all came back. Every one.

January 2010, SUNDAY
churches all over Scotland—and all over the world will be marking "Souper Sunday", when church services promise to be a little different.

This special day has been endorsed by The General Assembly of the Church of Scotland as a time when congregations might choose to hold elder-led acts of worship, followed by a simple lunch of soup and bread. As a result of the day it is hoped that all church members will become more aware of the many issues surrounding HIV. Also, Souper Sunday will offer a brilliant opportunity to raise much needed funds for a wide range of HIV initiatives at home and overseas.

Sweet Potato and Coconut Soup Serves 10

Ingredients:

25g/1oz butter; 2 large onions, roughly chopped; 2 cloves of garlic roughly chopped; approximately 2kg/4lb sweet potato; 4 pints vegetable stock; 400ml can coconut milk; ground black pepper; chopped parsley (optional).

Method:

Melt the butter in a large pan; sauté the onions and garlic until golden; add the sweet potato; cook for 4 – 5 minutes, stirring occasionally; add the stock and bring to the boil; simmer until the potato is soft (approximately 15 minutes); place the soup in a blender and cream; allow to cool slightly and stir in coconut milk.

Season to taste; gently reheat to serving temperature; serve with some chopped parsley to garnish, if you wish.

Mmmmmmmmm!!
