THE MANSE

Dear Friends

It has been decreed that the month of April was the driest April in the United Kingdom since records began. In Aberdeen we certainly enjoyed a dry and sunny spell; maybe not as warm as elsewhere in the country but pleasant nonetheless. The good weather this spring certainly provided a talking point.

Another and much more important talking point this spring, is the movement in various countries in the Middle East and in Africa to oust governments/ dictators from seats of power. Sadly many have lost their lives and as we continue to observe the troubles in Libya and Syria we might expect more deaths and injuries to come.

I don't think it's a coincidence that these coups and rebellions are taking place at the same time. More importantly political commentators and political leaders recognise there is no coincidence in these happenings. Whatever the starting point there is clearly a fervent appetite for change in these countries where people have lived under harsh and draconian conditions imposed on them by oppressive leadership.

It's no surprise that people seek liberty - the opportunity to attempt to forge a better life for themselves, and their families. The conditions that exist just now seem to be fuelling such a desire across the world for freedom and for the right to live more liberated lives.

Living in a settled democracy as we do, where liberty and freedom (within constraints of civil law) are accepted as the norm, I think it has taken the sights we see on television to remind us of how lucky we are. We have had the opportunity for self expression, the right of religious tolerance and the democratic freedom to vote.

When we think of this and other human related matters in the light of our Christian Faith we see in the teaching of Jesus and all that He stood for, a passion for freedom and liberty. Jesus spoke for the poor and the oppressed. He fought for the rights of those who had no voice and those who were persecuted for their belief. He fervently pursued justice for those victimised by the rich and the powerful.

Ultimately Jesus died in order to give God's people liberty; first and foremost a liberty from sin but in some ways also the freedom to move on in life and enjoy the fruits of creation – the created life which is God's wonderful gift given equally to all.

I pray that the current escalation of violence and uprising in the world will come to a swift end.

I pray too that people everywhere will gain the freedom to be able to pursue life and a relationship with God as He intends, free from hindrance, free from enslavement, free from persecution, free from all that would hold them back.

I pray that people everywhere come to recognise God in the good things of life and give thanks to Him for his benevolent goodness to his creatures. God Bless *Keith*

My unforgettable journey through Mannofield

When we, as Christians, learn to hear His voice, He works in us both to will and to do his good pleasure



(Philippians 2:13). Since 1975 God has been speaking to me about ministry through the word, prayer, fellowship, circumstances, experiences, evangelistic encounters and confirmation of family and friends.

Mannofield has become a place of transition during which God has worked in me to clarify His good will and pleasure for auxiliary ministry. Coming from Ghana and Oldmachar, I had thought that I would find it difficult to integrate into the environment of Mannofield. However, the warm welcome and friendships built made it a fruitful and enjoyable placement.

I experienced a variety of congregational worship, singing, prayer, services, activities and preaching styles. I learnt a lot from the meetings I attended: Kirk session, Church business and staff meetings. As well as being an observer, participant and a learner, Mannofield gave me the platform to take part in various activities. I have received some very helpful and constructive criticisms from members and the minister.

All of these are helping to reinforce my strengths and provide a basis for how I will work on my weaknesses. Ministers' devotion to parish work, visitations, prayers, direction and counsel as well as members' sense of reverence and devotion to God and His work provided an excellent learning environment. Taking part in an Alpha course, "Messy Church" and two Bible Study sessions broadened my cycle of friendships. Thus Mannofield has enabled me to understand the broader church context within which ministry of the Word must take place.

Throughout my time in Mannofield, I also looked for signs of discouragement but found deeper conviction, increasing joy and deep-seated peace about my call. I put it down to the friendly atmosphere, devotion of members to church, sacrificial attitude and your faith in what God will do through you in the Community. In Session.....with Scribe



The reinforcement of our Kirk Session by the appointment of new elders continues apace. The names of candidates who have agreed to nomination were announced at the April meeting of Session, while others were still considering offers of Kirk Session membership. The ordination of the new recruits is scheduled for Sunday, June 12.

There has been progress, too, in the redevelopment of our church buildings. Keith reported that approximately £80,000 has been raised to date, and that plans have been submitted to Presbytery, with the architect instructed to lodge an application for planning permission.

Obtaining the necessary approval, however, will take a minimum of three months.

Among reports from the various committees, Session was informed that Edna Cromarty has been appointed as the new convener of the Worship & Devotion Committee, which is to undertake an analysis of evening worship.

Session was also informed that the Country Dance Class will in 2012 reach the 50th anniversary of both the class and Maureen Allan as its leader.

This double event will be marked by a celebration in the autumn of next year.

Under "Minister's Matters", it was announced that as part of "Celebrate Aberdeen", there is to be a street march on June 11, bringing together the voluntary sector and highlighting the work it does. So far, 80 organisations, including Mannofield Church, have agreed to take part. Alisa will be organising our contribution to this event.

The next Session meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, 7 June at 7.30pm and subsequent dates for Session to meet this year are 30 August, 25 October and 13 December.

This Day in May

22 May: The Emperor Constantine

The Emperor Constantine was the first Roman emperor to adopt Christianity as a religion.

The story goes that he had a vision of a flaming cross inscribed: "In this sign conquer", during a battle against his rivals at the Milvian Bridge, near Rome in 312. After the battle had been won he instituted new toleration to previously persecuted Christians and Christianity became the state religion in 324. He addressed the great Council of Nicaea in 325. His mother, Helena, became the first 'tourist' to the Holy Land. Although attributing his success to his conversion and going on to establish Constantinople as a new Christian capital in the East, building many churches, his later years were somewhat bloodthirsty. He was baptised only just before his death in 337.

Also on this day: The Disruption in 1843 was the cataclysmic event at which a large portion of the established Church broke away to form the Free Church. The causes were several but a main issue was the question of the relationship of state to Church.

Following other reunions, the two great 'halves' of the Reformed Church in Scotland came together in 1929 to re-form the Church of Scotland.








In a certain mountain village, a nobleman wondered what legacy he could leave his townspeople. Finally he decided to build a church as a legacy. The complete plans for the church were kept secret but when it was finished the people marvelled at the church's beauty and its completeness.

But an astute observer asked, "Where are the lamps? How will the church be lighted?"

The nobleman pointed to some brackets in the walls, then he gave to each family a lamp to be carried to the worship service and hung on its proper place on the wall.

"Each time you are here, the area where you are seated will be lighted," explained the nobleman. "Each time you're not here, that area will be dark. Whenever you fail to come to church, some part of God's house will be dark."
