

Dear Friends

In the lead up to the two major festivals in our calendar people often ask me 'Are you ready for Christmas?' and 'Are you ready for Easter?' These are big events for all of us and people recognise that for me as a minister, they are big events to plan for and celebrate. When the big days finally arrive and people offer the



greeting 'Happy Christmas' and 'Happy Easter', I feel the same adulation we all feel in celebrating the presence, promise and assurance of God in our lives but as someone who has a heavy workload in the run up to these days there is also a sense of relief to have finally reached the focus of the work.

We recognise Christmas and Easter as two big events for the Church and secular society has in a sense adopted them and adds fervor of its own to these occasions.

As you read this we are about four weeks away from a very significant event in the Christian calendar. The day of Pentecost is Sunday 27 May. Part of me would wish you to say, "Isn't it a shame that we don't observe it with the same fervor as Christmas and Easter?" Another part of me is quite happy that we don't create a third religious and secular festival season in the year for me to plan for and be greeted with the words, 'Are you ready for Pentecost?'.

With a good splash of decorum and poise I do think it valuable to consider the relevance of the time we are now entering - leading up to Pentecost. A popular misconception is to say Pentecost is the Church's birthday. That suggests, like our own birthdays, we use a date to annually remember the date we were born.

ACTS 2: 42 however says the Lord "**added** to their number". That clearly means the Church was in existence before Pentecost.

There already was an 'ekklesia' (church) which believed in the resurrection and which came together to find ways to influence others and society with a message of God's Love. What Pentecost added was a dash of God's Spirit that gave impetus and direction to the new movement commonly referred to as 'The Way' that moved on from the great deeds of God, witnessed in the resurrection and Jesus' self-sacrifice on the Cross.

Pentecost is a far older festival in the Christian calendar than Christmas or Easter and it deserves a bit of a fanfare; for the gift of God's Spirit to His Church and to His people is no small act. We will say more of Pentecost a month from now but meanwhile we might wish to ponder the fact that long before Pentecost a group of believers were already forming themselves into a Church. They came together as a fellowship of people - brought together by a sense of God's Love for the world. They would have common beliefs on certain matters but as human beings I suspect that they had their different positions on specific points of faith much as we have differences in perspectives within the Church of Scotland today.

I am sure we can learn from this fledgling Church - that the *way* we believe and *what* we believe matter less (far less) than the fact that God draws us together because **we do** believe that God has revealed his love for the world in the Cross and Resurrection, and has commanded those who believe in Him to 'love the world as He loves us'.

I suspect it was this simple mantra of shared conviction and experience that brought the Church together and shaped it and fuelled it in its embryonic days; in that time before God's adrenalin shot of Holy Spirit was given on the day of Pentecost. I hesitate to say it but, 'Have a Happy Pentecost' when it comes. Meanwhile give thanks for the Church in its earliest days and now. *Keith*

IS YOUTH WORK WORKING

Recently I read a challenging, thought provoking article in the Christian youth work magazine. The writer posed the question:

Is youth work working?



The writer shared his experience of growing up in a close youth group which attended various retreats and residential courses along with other special events. They participated in youth bible study and undertook various church projects. At the time who would have thought that in a few years when they were older, only three people out of a large group would still be attending church?

Sadly, looking around the Salvation Army in Aberdeen and the North of Scotland area, I share the writer's experience. Having attended various Bible camps with my youth group friends and friends from other Salvation Army centres, worshipping and sharing together today only around two or three of us from Aberdeen remain committed Christian believers. So many others throughout the area have fallen away and become disinterested. So I am researching how to help our young people build a lasting faith and to try and look to the future as well as the present.

It was a privilege to help with the Prayer Space in Airvhall School. One of the 'zones' was 'Big Questions' where kids were invited to write a question on a card and peg it on a string. By the end of the week this zone was full of so many deep questions. Some of the profound things the children came up with simply blew me away.

For one thing in a society which doesn't like to 'do God', these children clearly want to engage with Him and have questions ranging from the simple to the profound.

That encouraged me as did the 24 March sleepover of the Youth Group followed by their presentation at the Service on 25 March

That presentation was based on the work of OPEN DOORS UK, a charity which campaigns on behalf of persecuted Christians around the world.

In the service the youth led prayers of intercession on behalf of six of the countries where Christians suffer the most for their faith.

The prayer time included lighting candles representing the light of Christ for each of the countries as they were read out. Other readings included stories of persecuted Christians.

Poverty is a scandal - It can be ended

Huge change is taking place in the town of Gbap (pronounced bap), Sierra Leone.

Sierra Leone is one of the poorest countries in the world. More than half the population live on less than 80p per day. Ten years of brutal civil war has severely hampered development. With little infrastructure in many areas, it is one of the hungriest places in the world.

Four out of five families in rural Sierra Leone do not have enough to eat.

Things started to change with the arrival of the Methodist Church of Sierra Leone (MCSL)

Christian Aid works entirely through local partners – local organisations on the ground – who know the needs of the communities in which they work. MCSL is one such partner.

It encouraged the community to set up a village development committee (VDC) that gave the community a channel through which to make their voices heard. Power structures in Sierra Leone are complex, and the voices of women and younger adults, in particular, have traditionally been ignored.

MCSL has helped the people of Gbap to move beyond hunger.

Tools for the job

At the same time, MCSL also looked at the small town's farming output and set up a food production group. It provided seeds and some basic tools – hoes and farming knives – which were distributed by the VDC. It helped the group to cultivate the vast floodplain outside the town. By doing this, they developed a communal rice farm in addition to a cassava plot.

The benefits of being properly fed speak for themselves: but the security of being fed has allowed the community to think beyond mere survival.

The people of Gbap have taken their future into their own hands.

Helped by MCSL, the people of Gbap lobbied for government funding to improve life in their small town. They are well on the way to having two strong and inspiring symbols of change.

An agricultural work centre will house machinery with which the people of Gbap can process their raw produce and command a higher price at market.

Building for the future

Children in Gbap can now look forward to a brighter future.

A new school building is a long overdue replacement for the previous building, which was cramped, termite-ridden and structurally unsafe. It opened this school year, and is complete with latrines and a new kitchen.

MCSL is working with 63 other Sierra Leonean communities near Gbap. In some, the project was met with scepticism, but people are starting to see the benefits this can bring.

Around the world, Christian Aid is giving people the tools to help themselves.





BETHANY CHRISTIAN TRUST MANNOFIELD HELPING THE HOMELESS IN ABERDEEN



Bethany Christian Trust is a Scottish charitable organisation established in 1983 by the Rev Alan Berry of Leith to help the plight of homeless people in Scotland and to tackle the issues of homelessness. It operates in various towns in Scotland including Aberdeen. It has a full time staff of 200 and about 2,800 volunteers. In Aberdeen it works in partnership with Kings Community Church in King Street who provide drop-in facilities. Crown Terrace Baptist Church also has drop-in facilities.

During the winter months, December to February inclusive, sleeping facilities are provided at various churches (20 I believe) in Aberdeen seven nights a week. Before homeless people bed down for the night they are provided with a hot two course meal. Mannofield volunteered to provide the catering for at least two nights during the winter and 14 people from Mannofield volunteered. I was included in a team comprising Lynn Allan, Alan Thompson, Anne Thompson, Linda Fraser and Mairi Marr.



Our instructions were to appoint a leader, a buyer (for the food) and go forth and cook a meal for possibly 10 people. By due democratic means I was appointed the leader and I also agreed to be the buyer. Lynn Allan came to my rescue by volunteering her husband Joe as the chef and then accompanying me to ASDA to help out with the purchases. We decided on a beef and vegetable curry with a date and walnut sponge and custard for the pudding.

We all met at Kings Community Church on Sunday 22 January at 7.30 pm and some of the team assisted Joe in preparing the meal in the small but well equipped kitchen. The number we had to cater for had been reduced to 6 so we had plenty of food. Two staff from the Bethany Christian Trust arrived and their job was to collect homeless people from the agreed rendezvous outside the Citadel in the Castlegate. Their other tasks included preparing bedding for the night and manning the church during the night.

After we were briefed by the Trust we had a short service and the Trust chaps went off to collect homeless people. It turned out that only one man was picked up as another had arrived at the Church under his own steam. We therefore definitely had plenty of food! We were told that the numbers needing the facilities had dropped in recent months because Aberdeen City Council was making progress in housing homeless people and the mild winter was also a factor. In the event it was decided that the two men could be accommodated in a hostel in the centre of the city and they were duly taken there after a good and very ample meal! After clearing up, members of the team were back home by about 11 o'clock. All in all, it was a very satisfying night. It would be rather remiss of me not to say that the other Mannofield team led by Tim Still did a similar task on 16 February at Queen Street Church where they catered for 10 people. Jim Ruxton

Our group of 8 boys & 3 staff drove down to Glasgow on Friday night then on Saturday visited the new £70m Riverside Museum: Scotland's Museum of Transport & Travel which opened last year. It's a fantastic place and a very unusual building. There are several reconstructed streets, walls of both cars and motorbikes where everything is positioned on



giant shelves. We were able to explore the exhibits and lots of interactive terminals around the building. We spent the whole morning there before a quick picnic lunch and off to the swimming pool.

This was no ordinary swimming pool however. Billing itself as Scotland's only indoor water theme park there was a lot of anticipation. We were not disappointed. Waves, flumes, rapids, dump buckets, slides - it had everything. The highlight was the 4 man tube ride where 4 people occupied a giant rubber ring. We then rocked and floated down a huge flume, sliding high up each of the sides of it as we went. The ride didn't last long but was brilliant fun. A well spent hour and a half.





Saturday evening was spent in the hall with a chipper tea, some games, sport and a DVD to finish off. On Sunday morning we joined the congregation for worship. Several of our boys took part in the service by doing a reading, a short talk about our visit and accompanying the local praise band on trumpet. The highlight of Sunday afternoon was a game of LaserTag, indoor golf and a ride on the dodgems at Xscape in

Braehead. But all good things come to an end and it was time to have tea and travel back to Aberdeen. A thoroughly enjoyable time was had by all of us. Roll on next year!



Nicola Youngson's visit to Kamuli, Uganda

In February 2012 my husband Gary and I went with a group of people from Tillydrone to an area called Kamuli in North East Uganda. Our aim was to continue previously made links with a school and orphanage and a community of people who have HIV and AIDS.

In order to do this we needed the help and support of friends and family by way of fundraising and donations of

clothing, school equipment and suitcases to carry everything.



We personally did a lot of work at Bezallel School including redecorating a nursery classroom, kitting out the medical room with supplies and arranging for further improvements to be made for the pupils, boarders and staff.



One of the most significant changes we funded was to introduce a lighting system for the whole school including the dormitories when the power is off — which is most of the time! Could you imagine sharing a bedroom with over 50 other children aged from 2 to 15 with no lighting?

The whole experience reminded us about what we take for granted at home - electricity and water on demand and free education for all children. The children were really appreciative of anything they got from a lollipop, pencil to a new T-shirt. They never complained and thrived on attention they got from their new friends and visitors from Scotland. Although it was very difficult emotionally at times we loved our

experience and feel that Uganda now has a special place in our hearts.

Thank you again for the help and support you offered us and the children of Bezallel.


