THE MANSE

Dear Friends

This is the season of 'Thanksgiving'.

"Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice!" Philippians 4:4

As the days grow colder and the nights longer it is traditional in this season to give thanks to God for the Harvest. Historically of course, and in part today, this means showing appreciation for the bounty of the fields and the plentiful food on the supermarket shelves of our country. It also provides the opportunity to thank God for the other gifts He gives us, such as family, love, health etc.

I find it interesting as I reflect on these words of Paul to notice that he doesn't go overboard in terms of the thanks he offers for the comforts of the secular society he is part of, or the privilege of being associated with the religion that was dominant in the middle east at the time, namely Judaism.

As a Roman citizen Paul would seem to have reason to rejoice. Rome, mighty Rome, was arguably the greatest consolidation of power that humanity had known to that time. Rome was a marvel of might and technological prowess. Its roads ran throughout its empire. Its buildings were magnificent and the standard of life for many was improving with every new initiative. It was also a marvel of law and government, for no nation had ever been administered as effectively as the Roman Empire. If any people had a right to be thankful it was the Romans and the people who lived and benefitted from the improvements of the time.

Paul was also an expert in the religious law of the land. As a member of the Pharisaic party, few would have known as much about the Jewish law and understanding of God's teachings as Paul. If anyone had a right to be proud and a right to rejoice concerning their religion, it was the Pharisees. Many of them were overtly proud and were not slow to show it.

Yet, how odd it is, that Paul's proclamation does not rest on the comforts provided by an improving secular society, or in the superior beliefs of a particular religious understanding and relationship with God. Paul is not describing a rejoicing which comes from a secular emphasis. He does not claim the Roman Empire as the source of his comforts or the Jewish religion as the source of his blessing. His proclamation is straight-forward and simple - "Rejoice in the Lord; Rejoice only in the Lord!"

As we offer thanks in this season for the food on our table and the quality of the life we have as a result of what is available to us in our society and while we might recognise our Christian religion as providing rich joy, let us not be slow to make sure that the object of our thankfulness is God and God alone. It is He who is to be praised; for the good things of life come from and through Him and from nowhere else.

The process will be as follows:

How in your own mind do you know we have been successful? What are we doing the same or differently to use our church to best effect? What am I, your minister, doing the same and differently? How is the local community working with us? How do you want future communities to describe our period as custodians of Mannofield Church - its congregation and community?

Your ideas for the future of Mannofield Church and the community are really important. During our service on Sunday 14th October time will be given to reflect, discuss and write down ideas for our future.

We will then collate your ideas and use them to guide a discussion that will begin with a series of Kirk Session events at which Elders will think about the future and ultimately set targets.

Early plans, including time-limited targets, will be included in a future Church magazine and displayed on our web page and I will also give a summary of our conclusions at a future Church service.

44th BBs Aviemore Camp Summer 2012

The Company Section of the Boys Brigade recently enjoyed summer camp during what must have been the best weekend of the summer. We headed off to Aviemore back in August for a weekend camp with 11 boys and 3 staff in three 10man tents.

Pitching the tents on Friday evening was a bit frantic with the fading light and the appearance of

'monkey style' without landing in the pond and it's harder than it looks. Several boys


water. The weather was beautiful and even the cold water of the Loch seemed nice after a while. We spent most of the day there before





Whose we are and Whom we serve 6 NEW PROJECTS TO SUPPORT!

Continuing the three-year themed cycle of work which has seen its members reach record levels of giving, even in these straitened economic times, the focus of the Guild's work moved this summer into looking at faith and how members reflect that in their daily lives.

Have you ever wanted to be involved in choosing something, only to find the choosing becomes quite a challenge? The National Projects and Topics Committee had to select the 6 new projects. 33 proposals came before us and each one was worthwhile! We made the choice last October and then had to keep the secret till April this year. "Whose we are and Whom we serve", which echoes the Guild's motto since its founding 125 years ago, will see members invited to raise awareness of, pray for, and fundraise for the following areas of work:

• <u>Heart for Art</u> is looking at the use of art therapy in the care of those with dementia. The project offers the opportunity for people with dementia and their carers throughout Scotland to build supportive relationships and access support and advice from CrossReach staff.

• <u>Mary's Meals</u> will work in Liberia, one of the poorest countries in the world, to provide food and resources for school children. Hundreds of children were recruited to fight in a war which has had long and devastating consequences for Liberia.

• <u>A Passage from India</u> is dealing with micro-financing of enterprise within Urban Priority Areas in Scotland.

• <u>The Julius Project</u> recognises the problems faced and support required by people entering social housing tenancies following a period of homelessness.

• <u>Out of Africa into Malta</u> addresses issues faced by refugees escaping from a range of tragic circumstances in Africa and coming to Malta to seek hope.

• <u>Comfort Rwanda</u> whose work is to extend a project in which those who were responsible for the genocide that killed 1million Rwandans in 100 days are building new homes for the survivors.

So, we have a varied choice taking in all ages, from Scotland through Europe and into Africa.

I am looking forward to seeing how these are embraced by Guild members and the congregations here in Mannofield, in Aberdeen and nationally. A lot of thought and prayer went into the choice but you must agree, what a challenge!
