One of our leaders was running a class in the Physio Gym in the hospital at the time of the name change. As usual she had to stop at the barrier before getting into the hospital grounds, and thought it was wise to introduce the new name. "Friskis&Svettis - used to be Swedish Style Exercise" she said to the little chap on the barrier. Blank look. "Fit?" he asked. "We're

now called Friskis&Svettis" she said with what she hoped was a winning smile. Another pause - then he turned and said into the speaker control "It's the wifie from Biscuit & Lettuce". And the barrier went up!

But whatever we're called - the exercise remains the same - it's safe, effective and above all fun. You exercise at your own level, there's no competition and the routines are easy to follow because the music is inspiring. The class lasts for one hour and in that time we raise our pulses to exercise our hearts, we stretch to increase flexibility, we work on the floor to strengthen our back - upper and lower, shoulders and tummies and then we cool down and relax. The class is suitable for everyone who would like an all over workout and we have a very wide age range but you do as much as you feel you want to. When people ask if they would manage a class we tell them "If you can get on the bus to get to the class - you can do it!" A warm welcome awaits you if you would like to have a go.

Dear Friends

I think most of us would agree that despite the hectic lead -up, the pressure of planning and the cost of preparing for it, the season of

Christmas is something we really look forward to. Children understandably are excited by the approach of Christmas. As adults we too are somehow captured by the magic of a season that weaves its spell through music, colourful decorations, lights and smells. The season of Christmas builds up over weeks and it's no wonder that it brings with it such heightened expectation.

There is however a potential problem lying in wait. Like many other things in life the more expectation builds, the higher the chance we end up feeling our expectations have not been met. We pay a fortune for a concert ticket or sporting event and afterwards we wonder why we bothered! When it comes to Christmas, so often the problems I hear people refer to come in the form of comparisons with 'Christmases past'. I hear people saying, 'Christmas just isn't like it used to be.' 'Christmas television is not as good this year.' 'What happened to the great Christmas songs filling the charts?' 'Christmas is over much quicker than it used to be.' One of the most common complaints is often 'What happened to the snow? I am sure it used to snow regularly at Christmas.'

Christmas is a perfect example of 'rose-tinted spectacles'. The truth is, in most cases, the problem lies not with the poorer offerings of the season but with our own inability to be content and absorb the joy from the special character and significance of Christmas.

Even the Church is not immune to the comparisons with Christmases past. Many people comment that the attendances at the special services around Christmas are not as high as they once were, particularly the Watchnight Service. If we take a realistic view of the popularity of church attendance at Christmas we recognise that these services are actually pretty well attended. Many people, both regular church attendees and the less regular, still recognise the value of attending church at Christmas and make every effort to include this as part of their Christmas Celebrations.

In the singing of familiar carols and the opportunity to become immersed in a life-changing and world-changing story that is full of hope and promise, the icing on the cake is added to the top of all the other traditions of the season. Rather than complain in the weeks that follow Christmas that it was all over too fast or it wasn't as good a celebration as expected, I think there is encouragement given for us to take to heart the adage 'you get out of Christmas what you put into it'. If we throw ourselves into the season I am sure we will be richly entertained and blessed. If we seek a greater guarantee of finding what we might be looking for in the season I would suggest we find it in making space for an experience of 'church' during the Christmas season

and allowing ourselves the opportunity to become caught up in the most wonderful story ever told. It has the power to transform our outlook and perspective and bring significance to our celebrations that meet all our expectations and more.

May God bless you and your families in this season of Christmas.

TLC Foodbank

It was with mixed emotions that on 7 October 2013 I attended the launch of the Foodbank Partnership Aberdeen



at the Townhouse. I was sad and dismayed that in 2013 in oil rich Aberdeen there is a rapidly growing need for foodbanks to support struggling families. I was impressed however at the drive, commitment and compassion of the many agencies and individuals who are involved in offering a helping hand. I am pleased that I am in a position to help drive forward the TLC Foodbank. TLC is a Scottish charity no SCO42674.

Taking cognisance of good practice within the 'Partnership' TLC will operate a foodbank out of Inchgarth Community Centre launching on Tuesday 3 December 3.30 till 6pm and Thursday 5 December 2-4pm and weekly at these times thereafter.

There will be a permanent collection point at Inchgarth and your support in the form of non perishable items and toiletries would be much appreciated.

The initial 'launch collection' at Sainsburys Garthdee on Saturday 26 October was a great success and the support from the store and all who donated was much appreciated. TLC hope to build on success and extend their foodbank work to the Torry area and elsewhere in Aberdeen in response to demand.

Each week The Boys' Brigade works with thousands of young people in the UK, many of whom have no other connection with the Church.

The 44th Boys' Brigade Company at Mannofield is currently recruiting new members in all its sections.

Anchor Boys is for boys from P1(min age 5) - P3 and meets on Thursday 6.00 -7.00pm. This is a small but enthusiastic group enjoying a variety of sports, games, crafts, stories and competition each week. Recently they had a pirate theme night, have made playdoh and enjoyed a spooky night at Halloween.

Junior Section is for boys from P4 - P6 and meets on Thursdays 6.45 - 8.15pm.

This group is also small in number but full of energy. They too participate in a variety of sports, games, activities and enjoy the weekly joke session. Recently they had a sports night, baked cakes and made bird feeders. They also took part in the International games competing against BBs in countries as far apart as Australia and Ireland.

Company Section is for boys from P7 - S6 and meets on Fridays 7.45 - 10pm.

Weekly gymnastic sessions on the Company vaulting horse are popular as well as outside trips including a burger n bowling night, beach cookout and the annual camp. This year that was spent in Dundee. Next year we are off to the Orkney Islands.

Each section follows an award scheme where boys can gain awards and badges for taking part in the weekly programme.

We provide a balanced selection of fun activities for children and young people from 5 to 18 through all our sections. Run by a dedicated team of people our staff are fully gualified BB leaders and are all cleared to work with children and young people by Disclosure Scotland. The building is only part of what we need to be doing. As a congregation we recognise that we need to be providing more care for our increasing number of elderly members and parishioners. At the same time we need to be offering activities and relevance to the younger age groups. It's a juggling act but Mannofield Church is up to the task.

Whether or not you are a member of the Church or someone who wants to share our modernised building, we need your continued support at this time. Please back us in our campaign to create Mannofield Church as a 'Heart of the Community,' your community.

GETTING OUR ECO-ACT TOGETHER

Have you ever tried to estimate your total personal impact on the



environment? For most people, the answer is "No". That need not be a problem, because at the individual level what really counts is our actions, rather than an ability to add up all the little and not-so-little bits of a complicated jigsaw. It's much easier simply to take opportunities to reduce our ecological footprint as they arise.

Things are rather less than straightforward when it comes to the ecological footprint of Mannofield Church.

because That's we can't do everything at once, so we have to decide where our priorities lie. Should we concentrate on our Church property and the way it is used and managed, or should we be looking at how we act as an important part of the wider community? Is it better to focus our early efforts on easy and obvious targets, or to spend more time on those which can deliver the biggest impact?

These are tricky questions. So to help plot our way forward, we are carrving out an environmental check-up which will log what we do at present and where we see some room for improvement. It will give us a better idea of where our environmental priorities should lie. We are using a template developed **Eco-Congregation** by Scotland. partly because it has been tried and tested elsewhere and partly because of its simplicity.

What's more, if we repeat the exercise in a few years' time, we will be able to see what progress we have made.

Much of what we might do to improve the environmental performance of our Church property will be delivered through our major development plans. But that does not mean that we can afford to stand still while we wait for the builders to move in. There's scope to improve the way we manage our existing premises and to be more thoughtful of our daily actions in our Church and home life.

If like us, you believe that we are part of God's creation, it follows that we have a responsibility to look after it.

The Pastoral Care Group consists of

- (a) The Caring Group.
- (b) The Audio CD service.
- (c) The hospital escort service
- (d) The car service
- (e) Delivery of the Church flowers

(a) Caring Group

The Group supports people in the parish who are

housebound, disabled, elderly or lonely.

They are initially visited by the Convenor who tries to set up a compatible 'friendship' with a member of the Caring Group. If circumstances change or the relationship breaks down, the situation is reviewed.

Those persons are referred to the Convenor by the Minister, elders and members.

(b) Audio CD Service

Each Sunday the service is recorded, copied and delivered to the housebound by volunteers.

(c) Hospital Escort Service

There are 2 teams of volunteers who go to A.R.I. one Sunday a month to take patients, mainly by wheelchair, to and from the Chapel for the service.

(d) Car Service

Volunteers provide car transport to and from Sunday services for those less able.

(e) Flower Delivery

The Church flowers are delivered by volunteers to the persons chosen by the Minister.





Airyhall play area gets new equipment

I am delighted that new play equipment is being installed at the play area beside Airyhall Community Centre and I know this is welcomed by many families.

Our pavements and roads

One issue I am regularly contacted about is the state of some

pavements and roads in our area. I am pleased that some repairs and resurfacing have been carried out but much, much more needs to be done and I will continue to ask the City Council to properly repair roads and pavements in our area.

Road safety worries

Road safety is an issue which concerns many residents and on behalf of our community I will, amongst other things, continue to:

- Press for a pedestrian crossing to be installed on the main road near Tesco's Mannofield store.
- Ask Police Scotland to tackle speeding vehicles on roads including Countesswells Road, Craigton Road and North Deeside Road.
- Urge that "red light cameras" are installed at pedestrian crossings on South Anderson Drive and Anderson Drive. Red light cameras would improve pedestrian safety by discouraging drivers from driving through red lights - and by catching those who still do so.

I am pleased that Traffic Scotland was eventually persuaded to change the phasing of the traffic lights at the junction of Great Western Road and Anderson Drive. This means people crossing whilst the "green man" is on are not now faced with cars still turning right from Great Western Road.

I was delighted to be asked recently to contribute to InSpire on behalf of Police Scotland's West End Community Policing Team.

We are a team of Officers comprising myself, 4 Sergeants, 21 Constables and 5 Special Constables working out of the building we share with Whinhill Medical Practice in the heart of the West End, providing 24 hour cover to the Airyhall, Ashley, Braeside, Broomhill, Craigiebuckler, Ferryhill, Mannofield, Ruthrieston and Seafield areas.

Since 1 April we have been part of Police Scotland but it is very much business as usual for us. Hopefully you will have seen no change to the first class service which we aim to provide during what has been a very interesting and challenging period of change.

What you should be seeing and should be expecting from my officers is that we continue to respond to the needs of the communities we are working alongside, and that the issues that you see as a priority become our priorities as well.

In addition to our on-going work to address issues with inconsiderate driving, speeding and failing to obey road signs, particularly at pedestrian crossings, which we have targeted through routine patrols and planned operations, a number of break-ins have demanded our attention recently. Secure and insecure houses have been targeted, in addition to car thefts and break-ins to vehicles.

Whilst varying degrees of property security have been overcome, on some occasions insecure houses and cars have helped these criminals.

We have recognised the issue and our investigations have seen several positive results over recent weeks. We have been carrying out planned overnight crime patrols in the affected areas and key to this is you calling us on '101' as soon as you see something suspicious, or '999' if it is on-going.

It's important too, particularly in the run-up to Christmas, that you lock up houses & cars at night, removing valuable property from vehicles, and making sure that keys and valuables are not immediately visible within the home. Use timer switches to bring on lamps and radios to make it seem as if there is someone at home. PIR security lights also help.

Enjoy this festive edition of InSpire, and on behalf of the West End Community Policing Team have a merry Christmas and a happy New Year.

We live in an area of town with relatively low levels of crime. However, I often receive complaints about road safety concerns especially in the



vicinity of schools such as Airyhall, Ashley Road, Harlaw Academy etc. I have asked the Police and Council for action against speeding traffic, dangerous driving and unauthorised parking. Unfortunately, the efforts to identify and penalise offenders has to be ongoing.

Parks, gardens and play spaces are much appreciated in our area. I am trying to ensure that Hazlehead Park, Johnston Gardens, Cromwell Road Park and other spaces are kept up to a decent standard. I have followed up concerns such as tree problems and vandalism at Johnston Gardens. Young people enjoy Pets' Corner at Hazlehead so it has been good to secure the funding to refurbish this facility. Other issues are now being dealt with at Hazlehead: improvements to the Piper Alpha and Queen Mother Gardens, proposed new toilets, a running route, more tree planting, various sprucing up work, etc.

Many like the walking routes in the area, such as those leading into and around the Hazlehead policies: so this is a further "green" priority that I am following up. I would very much welcome your comments and suggestions so that we can have good quality parks for all to enjoy.

Residents tell me they are worried that local residential developments will lead to congestion and road safety problems.

Current proposals are for 350 houses at Pinewood/Hazledene in Countesswells Avenue and for 3000 homes at "Countesswells village", located west of Hazlehead Golf Course along Countesswells Road. The concern is that the roads network in the west and centre of the city would not be able to cope with the increases in traffic volume.



Age is not important, fellowship is! Many of our members are over 80 years old and are the youngest in spirit!



This leaves fundraising which is a large part of what we do. Monthly coffee mornings with a Bring and Buy stall mean we can contribute to the Church's Development Fund.

Three big fundraising events every year mean we can send donations to two of the six National Guild's projects running from 2012-2015. This year we'll be supporting A Passage from India and Mary's Meals.

<u>A Passage from India</u> works in partnership with the Priority Areas Committee of the Church of Scotland to support Urban Priority Areas in Scotland.

Mary's Meals is working in Liberia, one of the poorest countries in the world, to

provide food and resources for school children. Hundreds of children were recruited to fight in a war which has had long and devastating consequences for Liberia.

We collect goods for Instant Neighbour and fill shoe boxes with little gifts to be sent abroad through Blythswood Care. We buy backpacks for the children who attend schools supported by Mary's Meals and we enjoy our knitting projects. These provide



warm hats for sailors of many nations, Linus blankets for sick children and goods for Uganda.

The Guild tries to help others at home and abroad through our fellowship, having fun and strengthening our faith.

The Golden Age Project This is about ministering to older people in the parish. Meetings should be easily accessed by all who find getting to church difficult. Conversation helps overcome isolation and loneliness either for those in their own homes, with or without carers, or for those in sheltered housing or care homes.

Mannofield is involved in the Golden Age Project and we already provide midweek services, Lunch Club, Coffee Stop, monthly services in Craigielea Gardens and more recently Northcote Lodge, outings twice a year and a Christmas sing a long afternoon. Supported by the Church of Scotland Guild we are part of a group of Churches throughout Scotland developing resources and ideas for this project. Have you ideas?

Can you think of other ways to be involved in this important branch of ministry? Why not come along and join us?






