

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
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

Dear Friends



Christmas is a special season. It does something to us. It is hard to put into words its power to transform and change perspective. Perhaps the best illustration of its all-consuming spirit is found 100 years ago in the dark, desolate, battle-scarred and muddy fields of Northern France.

In the devastation of the first months of war on the Western Front, where fierce fighting was taking place and soldiers were digging in and coming to terms with the fact that the fight was not going to be over soon, an unofficial and temporary truce took place. Records suggest heavy fighting was experienced in places on Christmas Eve and there were many casualties, but late in the day British infantrymen were surprised to see Christmas trees, branches with lights, appearing on the other side of No Man's Land and accompanied by the sound of German voices singing. British soldiers sang their own carols and on Christmas Day many attended Christmas services behind the lines. Over the next few days, according to personal letters dating from that time, the truce continued with some gatherings between the lines where cigarettes and souvenirs were exchanged, the dead were buried, and perhaps even a game of football took place.

That such a truce was experienced in the midst of the carnage of those early months of war is surely evidence of the way the Christmas story and its promise has the power to change perspective and reveal to people a different way.

The First World War was deemed the 'war to end all wars'. Sadly this wasn't to be the case and as we reflect on our world's problems today we recognise that along with war many other issues, both generally and individually, threaten to disrupt the search for peace.

Yet, we must keep believing that Peace in the world and in life is possible. The Christmas Story gives us **Hope** and **Incentive** - to believe in the opportunities for peace in life, and play our part in establishing it for the sake of all who live in the world today and those who will live in it in the future.

The world has changed a lot since 1914. What hasn't changed is that the Promise of Peace, made concrete in the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem, remains available to us all. I wish you all the peace and joy of Christmas.

Mannofield Church Heart of the Community Project Update November 2014

Earlier this year we set a challenge to the congregation, hall users and others to raise as much money as possible in the three months to June with the incentive being an offer from an individual to match fund what was raised up to £50,000. We surpassed this amount with the sum raised of £74,670 bringing the total raised to end July of £1,098,359.



amount with the sum raised of £74,670 bringing the total raised to end July of £1,098,359. Fund raising has continued since then and many and varied have been the events -

Whisky Tasting; Fraserburgh Half Marathon (£1,150 sponsorship for Keith Blackwood at the time of going to press); Sale of unwanted silver and gold which raised over £2500; the sale of Dinky toys; the repeat concert by Claire Telford and Wayne Robertson on 22 November; and the sale of a DVD.

This DVD was produced by Jim Ruxton and features the 1993 Mannofield St Andrew's Night celebration and the 1994 Mannofield May train outing to the Kyle of Lochalsh. You can still get a DVD from Jim – cost £5 - by contacting him at 01224 31608 or jadruxton@aol.com

With the income from these and other fundraising events plus the additional £15,000 grant pledged by the Church of Scotland the sum raised to date is £1.120 million. We expect this sum to increase as a member of the Congregation has pledged to match what the congregation raises by donations and fundraising in the period from 1 September to 31 December 2014 up to a maximum of £25,000. Although anonymity has been integral to these matching schemes, we are so grateful for the extreme generosity of the individuals concerned.

As things stand, based on estimates, we might need a further £100,000 to start construction by May/ June 2015. This seems a lot. However, we believe that the estimated figures for the cost of the required work may come down as we put the work to tender. Moreover the Trust team has been hard at work in identifying and applying to suitable trusts and has had some success from the many applications submitted.

Exciting times lie ahead. In the coming months let us keep up the good work, sharing together the sense that collectively we are all part of making this vision for our buildings a reality in the very near future.

This term at Airyhall School is going to be so busy but so much fun!

As a GP I am preparing for probably the busiest time of the year, although this autumn is the warmest I remember.

So how can you help yourself and stay healthy over the winter months?

Prevention is better than cure

If you are eligible you should be booking your appointment with your GP's surgery for your flu-jab. Almost one third of people are eligible; if you are over 65: if you have a chronic diabetes. illness. heart disease. asthma. COPD. chronic kidnev disease and new this year coeliac disease; you are also eligible if you are a carer; or if you have any condition that means your immune system is low. The vaccine has no live flu virus in it and will not give you the flu

If you are pregnant flu can be a very severe illness and it is important that you get your flu jab. This year we are again running a program of flu vaccination for children.

You may also be eligible for other vaccines including pneumococcal vaccine, which prevents some types of pneumonia and if you are over 70 you may be offered the shingles vaccine. If you have any questions about the winter immunisation program contact your surgery.

Slips and falls

As the weather gets colder pavements get slippery, not just with ice but soggy leaves. Many folk suffer falls and a good few broken bones result. Be aware of conditions under foot, wear sensible footwear. (I am sounding like my Granny now) Don't be too proud, use a stick if you have to. Remember "Pride comes before a fall".

Stay warm

As we get older we lose our ability to cope with the cold. Hypothermia can be a silent killer as you don't notice you



are getting cold. Wrap up warm even in the house; put on an extra jumper; put that extra bar on the fire. If you are worried about the cost of heating heat your main room and your bedroom. There may be grants or additional funding available to help if you are struggling to meet costs.

If you have an elderly neighbour look out for them particularly if there is a cold snap and they are on their own.

Stock up your drug cupboard

Plan ahead. Work out if your repeat prescriptions or essential drugs are due to run out over the festive season. Remember this year most surgeries will be closed from Wednesday evening until Monday morning over Christmas and again over New Year.

Speak to your pharmacist about simple remedies that you can have in the house to treat yourself if you need to.

Eat, drink and be merry

MANNOFIELD PASTORAL CARE GROUP

The Pastoral Care Group consists of

- (a) The Caring Group.
- (b) The Audio CD service.
- (c) The hospital escort service
- (d) The car service
- (e) Delivery of the Church flowers

(a) Caring Group

The Group supports people in the parish who are housebound, disabled, elderly or lonely.

They are initially visited by the Convenor who tries to set up a compatible 'friendship' with a member of the Caring Group. If circumstances change or the relationship breaks down, the situation is reviewed.

Those persons are referred to the Convenor by the Minister, elders and members.

(b) Audio CD Service

Each Sunday the service is recorded, copied and delivered to the housebound by volunteers.

(c) Hospital Escort Service

There are 2 teams of volunteers who go to A.R.I. one Sunday a month to take patients, mainly by wheelchair, to and from the Chapel for the service.



Volunteers provide car transport to and from Sunday services for those less able.

(e) Flower Delivery

The Church flowers are delivered by volunteers to the persons chosen by the Minister.

With a decrease in the number of volunteers, we seek more people to give some of their time towards these worthwhile duties enabling us to provide appropriate care to individual people.






After the birth of Jesus, wise men (5A) to visit the young child. They had followed a special star which led them to the place where Jesus was.

In previous years, I was pleased to have Christmas lights set up in Great Western Road and Springfield Road. These will be in place again this year. Happy Christmas to All!

In October, the Council granted planning permission to build a new town of 3000 houses west of Hazlehead Golf course. I voted against this proposal but was unfortunately in the minority. The surrounding are

proposal but was unfortunately in the minority. The surrounding area will be impacted in many ways. Two new primaries and a secondary are proposed but they will not be built until a certain number of houses have been occupied. Pressure will therefore be placed on existing local schools to accommodate the new pupils. Residents in the surrounding communities are worried about the dramatic rise in traffic that will cause local problems. The Pinewood/Hazledene building work in Countesswells Road also continues to cause worries to residents and I am trying to help with complaints about traffic, drainage and flooding.

I have long supported the idea of local police patrols on bicycle so I was delighted that this is happening at last. Generous private sector donations have kindly contributed towards the cycling equipment. I believe the bicycles will help the police to tackle problems of crime and antisocial behaviour in our area.

Recently, I was again on the losing side on the decision about the St Nicholas House site in Broad Street. A minority of 18 of us voted against this massive, unsympathetic block of glass and concrete. The site was cleared in order to build a more open and attractive square. Residents have told me this very large building was in any case "a done deal". Thank you to everyone for working so hard to make their voices heard on this important issue. We tried our best! There have been some major events since the last newsletter. the Commonwealth Games, the Ryder Cup and the Scottish Referendum on Independence. Reporting Back Councillor lan Yuill Countesswells development issues

One decision made by the council – that 3,000 houses can be built at Countesswells – will have a major impact on our area. I consistently opposed this proposal but sadly the council decided otherwise. One big worry I now have is the impact this will have on local roads. Although the development will include new links to the A944 near Kingswells, much of the construction traffic in the early years will inevitably use existing roads.



The development will include new primary and secondary schools but, until those open, the Braeside School building will be reopened to accommodate primary age children from the new houses.

Dealing with a wide range of issues

Issues I continue to purse on behalf of residents include concerns about road safety, road and pavement repairs and concerns about grass cutting and tree management. One long-standing issue I continue to pursue is the dreadful state of the grass verges on Anderson Drive and South Anderson Drive. Sadly Bear Scotland, the company that maintains these on behalf of the Scottish Government, has failed to make any real improvements and I have recently contacted the Transport Minister about this.

I am here to help

Over the last twenty years I've worked in a variety of roles within Aberdeenshire, Aberdeen City and Roads Policing, and I was delighted to be offered this role. I've spent the last few months getting to know the area and the challenges within and was pleased to see that a number of strong community links were already well established by my predecessors. I am committed to advancing this aspect of my role.



lan McKinnon I've met with a number of key individuals in the community, and I'm very impressed at the proactive attitude shown by many and the community spirit that is clearly evident.

Having been asked to write an article for InSpire, I thought I'd take this opportunity to highlight a particular issue that is prevalent throughout my area.

As the nights get darker it is always worthwhile looking at your security arrangements for your car, sheds and houses.

Over the last couple of months we've had a number of reported crimes involving vehicles or properties that have been left unlocked. It is perhaps the downside of living in an area where people feel safe, and the pace of modern living, that security sometimes isn't always foremost in their minds.

We carried out a recent operation in the West End where we patrolled areas and visited over 600 properties to deliver security advice leaflets relating to vehicle security. During this operation we came across 4 unlocked vehicles, one of which still had the keys in the ignition! Clearly, no one wants to have things stolen from them, and our experience is that when people become the victim of a theft in these circumstances, they feel slightly embarrassed.

There is a perception that they are the only loser in this scenario, however if a thief finds rich (and easy) pickings in an area it may encourage him to return, so your lapse on this occasion may unfortunately mean your neighbour falls foul next time.

These things can be very easily overcome by some very simple tips:

- Ensure you lock your car door. Watch the lights and listen for the click 1. when you lock it remotely in case a seatbelt or other item has prevented the door from locking.
- 2. Remove valuables from within your car - think of it like a shop window for passing criminals.
- 3. Lock your garages and sheds and consider an inexpensive 'contact alarm' for these doors that sound if opened.
- 4. Always lock your house door, even when you are inside.
- 5. Keep car keys etc. away from the main entrances.

These very simple but effective measures at reducing crime, combined with the very overt community spirit where neighbours look out for neighbours will work very well towards ensuring you have a very nice (and uneventful) Christmas! Marzipan and Apple Scones

INGREDIENTS

8 ozs self raising flour

2 ozs butter

1 oz caster sugar

1 medium sized eating apple - chopped

3 ozs marzipan – grated

1 beaten egg

METHOD

Rub butter into flour and add sugar Add apple, marzipan and egg and mix to form a stiff dough

Knead for 3-4 minutes until smooth Roll out to $\frac{3}{4}$ inch thickness on a floured surface

Bake at 200^d for 15 minutes approximately

Healing Divisions

For much of the past two years my life seems to have been dominated by one thing – the referendum on Scottish Independence. It was like no other campaign that I have been involved in during my political career. It felt far more divisive than the usual political rough and tumble.



As I campaigned around my Constituency, I met numerous families who were split and individuals who avoided raising it with friends. This division left many of us wondering how the country would manage to come back together after the vote.

Throughout the referendum campaign, churches played an important part in hosting debates and I took part in two events in local churches. These were crucial in ensuring that local communities were able to participate and contribute to the debate as well as allowing those who were undecided to hear from both sides of the campaign.

It is also important to note that there were people of faith on both sides of the campaign. This was clear from the reconciliation services which took place in churches throughout Scotland on the Sunday following the referendum vote. These services offered the opportunity for people to come together and reflect on how best to move forward.

The one clear message during the campaign was that all Scots were united around a desire for change. I lost count of the number of times that I agreed with Yes campaigners that we need to create a fairer, more just society in Scotland – we just didn't agree on how to achieve it.

Recent reports have highlighted that there are still too many children living in poverty and we know that many people in our community will face fuel and food poverty this winter.

It seems that not only can we heal the divisions created during the referendum

campaign through our shared values but we can also come together to build a more prosperous Scotland. That's why it is now time for all the main political parties to work together as part of the Smith Commission to get the best settlement for Scotland.
