Dear Friends

With any luck we have finally seen the back of winter. By my calculations we first saw some snow in October and it snowed in April. Aberdeen faired slightly better than other places in that the snow was never particularly deep but it was consistent through the last six months.



I am no meteorologist but I do recognise that weather patterns are changing. Some would say this is down to 'Climate Change' brought on by an ever increasing world population and industrialisation. Others would argue that weather patterns are cyclical and history reveals long periods in the past where our weather statistics changed.

Personally I am inclined to accept that we are responsible for the changes taking place.

'Climate Change' or not, what we can agree about is that 'Care for Creation' is at the heart of the Biblical Story and its connection with the Creator God is indisputable. "The earth is the Lord's" declares the psalmist (Psalm 24:1). It is God's creation, not ours to do with as we please.

In the Biblical creation stories God subordinates rule over creation to humans to "fill the earth and subdue it" (Genesis 1:26-28). In doing so God lays on human beings the responsibility for how we manage the earth and every living creature, in ways consistent with the ways of the Creator. We call this stewardship or trusteeship. We are also called to be partners with the rest of creation in the on-going creative and renewing activity of God. In caring for what God has created, we care for ourselves, because in God's providence and wisdom our flourishing is dependent on the flourishing of creation. To care for what God has created is therefore also to care for each other, and especially for the poor and vulnerable.

"Eco Congregation" is an organisation that has its root in the UK but is now known throughout the World. It is hoped that our very own Eco Congregation group will be re-established in the very near future and that they will be able to help us consider further the themes of creation found in scripture; such as our connectedness with creation and our need to protect it. They will suggest ways we can play our part in looking after what we have been given.

Looking after God's Creation is an important part of the Church's theology and our Christian faith. Collectively and individually we are blessed with a wonderful

creation that brings us enjoyment and sustenance. We must look after what God has given us!

While we have been focussing a lot of energy in raising funds for our "Heart of the Community" Development Project, Mannofield is still very much interested in raising funds for the wider and deserving community, not only locally but also nationally and worldwide.

As part of the National Church of Scotland we support nation-wide ministry costs, the Church's extensive social care commitments and overseas work. Our "Ministries and Mission" contribution in 2012 was £104,938.

The sum of £3,400 was raised for Christian Aid 2012 by 'door to door' collection and sponsorship of runners in the Balmoral 10k. The vestibule "Well" raised £117 which was also donated to Christian Aid. Since 2008, over a £1000 has been donated to the charity via the Well.



There were 2 retiring collections last year – \pounds 728 for Somebody Cares and \pounds 607 for Poppy Scotland.

Pickled Cow Drama Group donated £450 to Befriend a Child.


And last but by no mean least Guild donations in 2012 amounted to \pounds 2,195 for a variety of worthy causes.

MPC's Instant Neighbour Team

This article is in response to a couple of queries as to why we are supplying these necessities to "drunks, druggies and skivers". We went to find out.



We now realise what a national concern food poverty is and it is p: 01224 489955 increasing alarmingly. Food Banks (and now many Church Credit Unions) are even needed in "wealthy" Aberdeen.

"Clients" are referred to Instant Neighbour from various agencies.

Who are the clients?

Mostly single persons, male and female, elderly and single parents. They come and sign in with their Benefits books to keep track of when they have received a parcel (only once a fortnight). They are given a bag of food suitable to their needs. Many only have access to a kettle. Could you easily make a meal with just that? Some have microwave ovens and some have hobs and ovens.

We have seen the shelves there groaning and have questioned why we were there. A fortnight later we were welcomed ecstatically when there were only a couple of tins and a box of cereal on the shelves. Last year at one point they were dividing boxes of tea bags into 5's and 10's before they had to close when nothing was available.

From April 2012 to Feb 2013 they had 1293 beneficiaries of food parcels. If these had been purchased it would have cost \pounds 14,500.

So it's not just the work shy, the drug addict or the alcoholic who get these parcels, certainly not when we have been delivering! Then we have met older men who have been made redundant and young mums with toddlers.

PLEASE keep the box at the front of the church filled especially during the summer. Anything goes as long as it is long dated and non perishable.

THANK YOU for your donations so far. They are much needed and much appreciated.

The Instant Neighbour Team

Instant Neighbour is a charity based in Aberdeen.

Despite being the wealthy oil capital of Europe, one in ten people are living in poverty in the city. Since 1984, Instant Neighbour has provided practical help, advice and support to some of the poorest and most vulnerable people living in Aberdeen City and Shire. The Charity recycles and distributes quality used furniture, clothing, child safety packs and baby equipment to people living on low incomes. They also distribute non-perishable food packages and can provide assistance moving house or storing furniture for people living on low incomes.



The total raised in 2012 by the door to door christian collection during the Christian Aid Week and as a result of people running the Balmoral 10k (£600) was £3,400.



Over £1000 has been donated by those attending church since 2008 through the "Well" in the vestibule and others have given or give regularly to Christian Aid in other ways throughout the year. All are greatly appreciated.

However the main fundraising for the charity is Christian Aid Week 12-18 Mav.

We are completely dependent on our hard core of ageing volunteers (of which I am one of the youngsters) to agree to collect door to door.

Inevitably, there are fewer collectors willing to collect door to door each year. So sadly I do not really see this total increasing in 2013.

I cannot emphasise enough the importance of having sufficient collectors because we cannot raise a penny without their help.

It is not the hardest of tasks. People leave church on a Sunday and go home to their comfortable home and Sunday lunch, whilst millions of people across the world starve or go without clean water.

Not all of our roll of 1200 are physically active but many are. Where are thev? We need vou.

By helping to collect, you are contacting people in the parish who would not normally come to church. More importantly you are also helping to save millions of lives.

If that's not mission I don't know what is.

This year we need collectors for door to door collection, street collection and counting - Monday 20 May at 6.00pm.

BITE BACK AT HONGER

This year's Christian Aid Week tells the story of how Christian Aid is helping communities to bite back at hunger through the lens of land rights in Bolivia, new technology in Kenya and innovative agriculture in Zimbabwe.



Zimbabwe: clean and reliable water

Please pray for rain

The south of Zimbabwe is arid and prone to droughts, leading to failed harvests and acute hunger for many people.

Unable to access clean and reliable water sources means many struggle to harvest even their strongest crops or provide safe drinking water to their families.

Working closely with the community, Christian Aid partner, Dabane Trust, has helped to build a sand dam, transforming not only their harvests but the life of the whole community.

Thanks to the sustainable farming techniques being taught by Dabane Trust, families are able to grow a range of crops to meet their own needs and even have a surplus to sell.

Access to water

Dabane Trust, a Christian Aid partner in Zimbabwe, uses the motto, 'We begin with water'.

When people have access to water it leads to many different things; water is needed to grow crops, to keep clean and healthy, to make cement for buildings, to cook and much more.

Dabane Trust has helped communities to access water during long periods without rainfall.

Sand dams are a means of storing water and after the installation of pumps and wells this water becomes accessible to those in need.

Dabane Trust has also been working to empower and train individuals in conservation farming - a technique which involves acting to preserve water.

This project is making significant changes throughout rural Zimbabwe. However, as the climate continues to change, so does the amount of water available. And as the rains become less frequent, the water in the sand dams will begin to dry up.

Both are in the large hall and an invitation is extended to all interested to come along.


