The Toolbox— one of many Articles written by the late Margaret Malloch

26 December 1927- 21 August 2018

Away back in the 1950s a young family bought their first television set. Several neighbours came to help with the installation. Some went up on to the roof to fix the aerial. However they had only a few meagre tools that would not do the job, so they came down.

On the doorstep stood a young couple who had only recently moved into the neighbourhood. They had a large toolbox which contained every possible tool for every possible job. The volunteers selected the proper tools, went back up on the roof and in no time the aerial was fixed. Everyone crowded into the living-room to watch the knowledgeable one. They thumped each other on the back and shook hands.

One of the women present said to the man with the toolbox "What exactly do you make with all these tools?"

He smiled and said "Friends."

What a lovely idea.

Of course, don't we all have within us tools of a sort which help us to make friends if we could just bring them to the fore at the right time?

A smiling face, encouraging words, a helping hand, a sense of humour, an uncritical attitude.

It is truly awesome when it begins to dawn on us that we have been "befriended by God."

When we read the Old Testament, it seems all the Promises of God, as written by the prophets, are for the Jews only.

Then we come upon a verse (and this is Isaiah 49.6) ".....I will make you a light to the nations so that all the world may be saved."



Balmoral Safari

In June this year Maureen and John went on a 3 hour tour round the estate in a very comfortable 6 passenger Range Rover. The following is an account of their successful trip: "The views were quite spectacular. We saw red deer and black grouse. Our very knowledgeable quide told us lots



of interesting facts about the estate. The gardens at that time were not very colourful as it is planned to be at its best when the Royal family is in residence. The estate is a working estate and has to be run as a business. Because of problems with mobile phone reception, workers use satellite phones.

There are 9 holiday cottages including one that houses 14 people. There is a 2 year waiting list for renting one over Christmas and New Year.

Deer are counted when they can be seen against the snow in winter. The Deer Commission decides the level of cull. Scottish Mountain ponies take the carcasses from the hills to the vehicles for transfer to the Castle. The innards are left for the birds. Apart from deer, ducks and grouse provide income.

There are over 70 ponies on the estate. Included are a few Austrian horses. They appealed to 2 young Austrian girls on the trip.

There is a large herd of Highland cattle that was started by the Queen Mother who got rid of the Aberdeen Angus herd. The herd is spread over the estate with calves being exported all over the world. There are 2 pairs of golden eagles on the estate. The estate has a large area of protected old Caledonian Pine forest.

We heard a lot about what the Royals do when they are in residence. This is more frequent than is reported in the Press as they relish the tranquility of Balmoral. We saw where the Queen goes riding and walking. She is obviously very fit for her age.

We saw some of the buildings used for picnics and BBQs. There is a waterfall (Garbh Alt) with metal bridge built by Brunel at Queen Victoria's request. It goes nowhere!

The whole afternoon was very enjoyable and instructive. I am sure we will go again."


